The Pleasant Grove Baptist Church near Rutherfordton was announced as winner of this award at the Baptist State Convention meeting in Asheville yesterday.

The Mt. Carmel Church, with an enrollment of 340 members, voted last year to enter the state-wide competition in adopting a rural church program of improvements for the coming year.

This Sunday the congregation plans a \$20,000 campaign toward a new \$90,000 church and educational building. Mt. Carmel church is the parent organization for the Chapel Hill Baptist Church as well as other churches of this area.

Among achievements during the past year on which the award was won, it was announced, were its Sunday School program and attendance record, its missions program, and physical plant and grounds improvement.
