

Manire Gets Post In Denmark

Dr. G. P. Manire, Associate Professor in the University Medical School, left this week for Copenhagen, Denmark, where he will spend the 1956 calendar year in research study at the Statens Serum Institut, a Danish biological production and research center.

Working under a Fulbright Research Scholarship grant, Dr. Manire will study the nature of toxic components and growth characteristics of influenza and other viruses.

Mrs. Manire and their two children accompanied him on his appointment, which was one of some 400 made for lecturing and research abroad by the Board of Foreign Scholarships of the Department of State. A member of the Department of Bacteriology and Immunology since 1950, Dr. Manire recently received a two-year grant of \$15,342 from the U. S. Public Health Service to continue his virus study after his return from Europe next year.

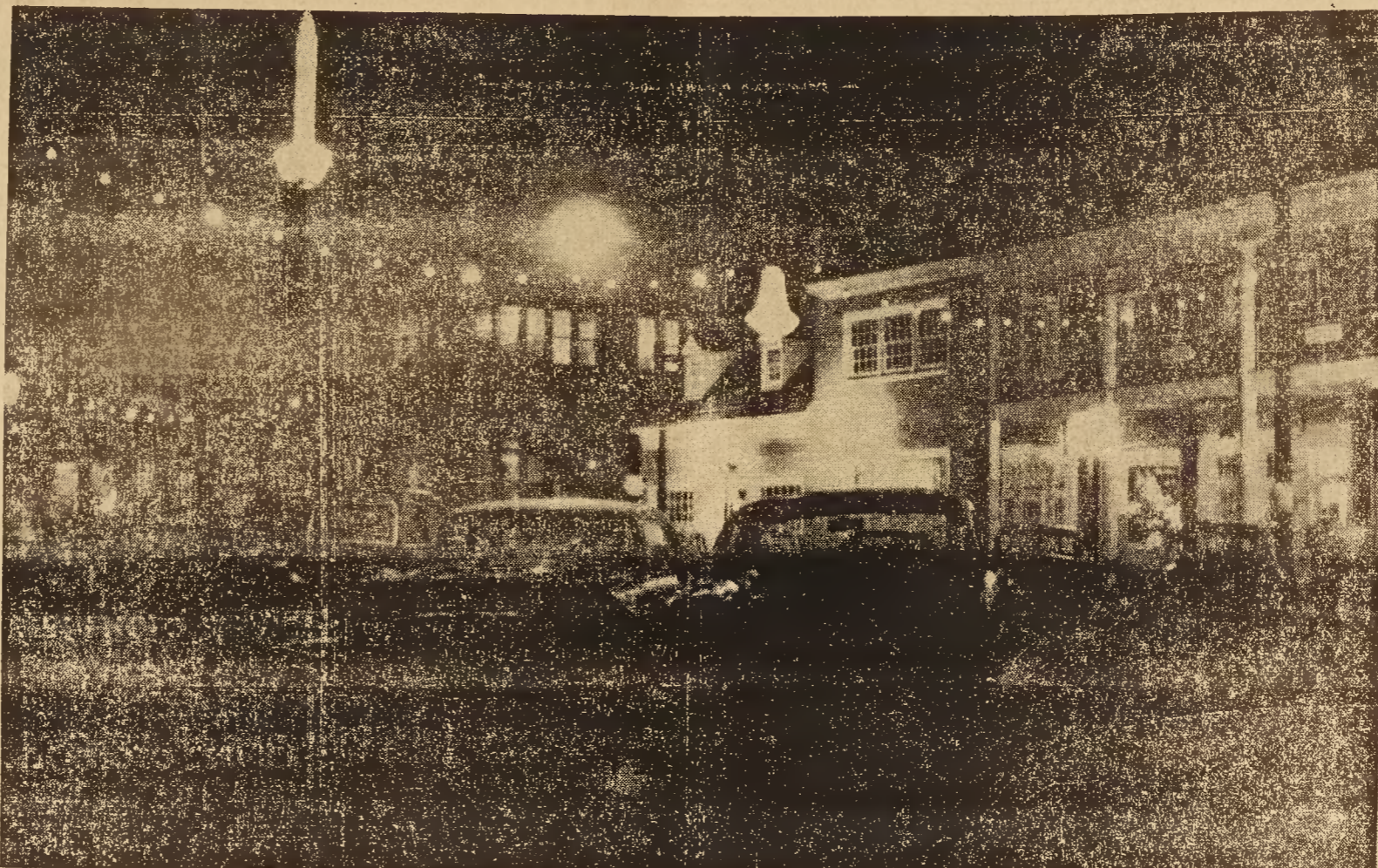

Heating Firm Is Building New Quarters

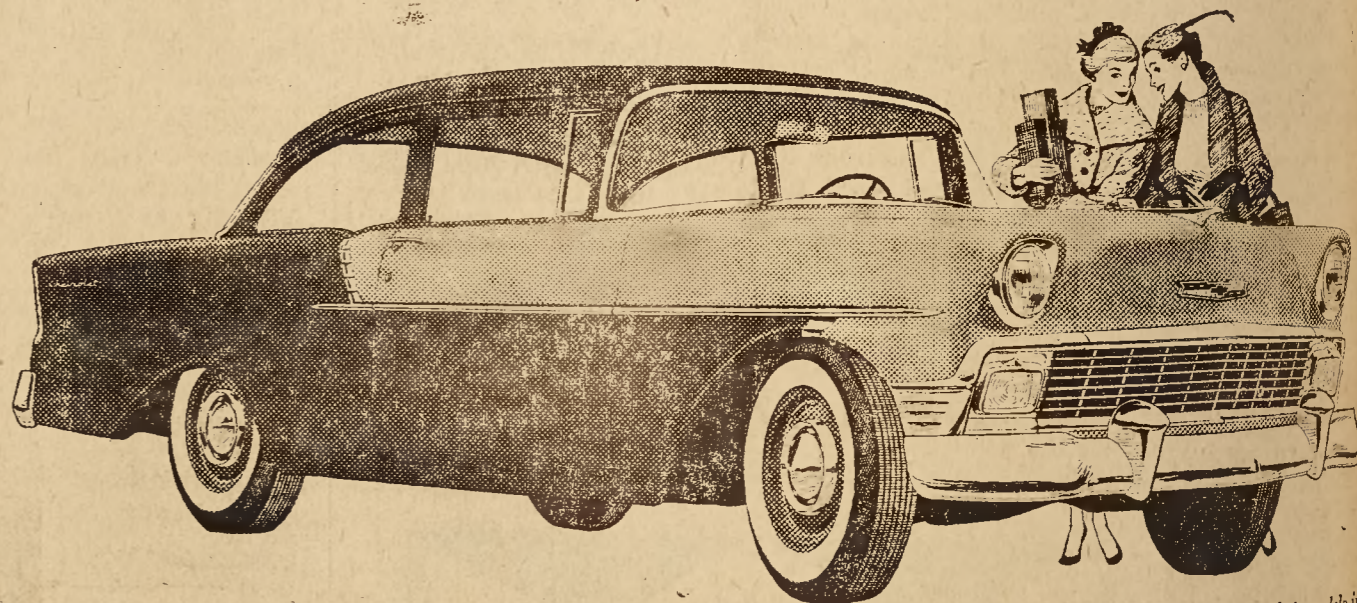
