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Camellia Authority Addresses Garden Club

Plant your camellias under pine trees for greatest success," suggested Duncan J. DeVane to the Chapel Hill Garden Club in an address last week. "You never find frost under pines, and your flower buds will be protected," he added.

Mr. DeVane, well-known grower of Fayetteville, has made extensive studies of the camellia and gave the names of varieties which should be hardy in this area. He considers Magnoliaflora, a pale pink in color, his number one favorite.

In discussing planting, he advised shallow planting with the top third of the ball of dirt out the ground. The plant should then be mounded up and heavily mulched, preferably with pine straw.
