

Give The Home A Festive Air With Greenery

You don't have to "spend any money to make your home festive for the Christmas season. Give your home a seasonal decor by using evergreens, berries, seed pods and pine cones, recommends Pauline Gordon, State College extension house furnishings specialist.

Use sprays for making table arrangements or for decorating your mantel. To make sprays all you need are evergreens, short lengths of wire, berries, balls bows or bells. Arrange pieces of evergreen in a desirable position, wire in place, add other pieces and wire. When the evergreens are arranged in a satisfactory spray, add the decorations.

Magnolia leaves .sprinkled with artificial snow also make effective Christmas arrangements. Put a little vegetable oil on a cloth and rub each leaf. According to Miss Gordon, the oil will give a lovely sheen to the leaf. To make artificial snow stick to a magnolia leaf, put liquid white shoe polish down the center vein and on the edges

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


