At the entrance to the house, the upper porch bannisters were decorated by a garland and wreath made of cedar, magnolia leaves, pine boughs and cones, arranged by Mrs. H. R. Totten. The front door held a large wreath of fir foliage, holly and pine cones, all delicately gilded. This was beautifully executed by the Club President, Mrs. C. H. Pegg.

Assisting Mrs. Pegg in receiving in the drawing room were Mrs. John W. Fuller, Mrs. P. H. Quinlan and Mrs. F. H. Edminster. 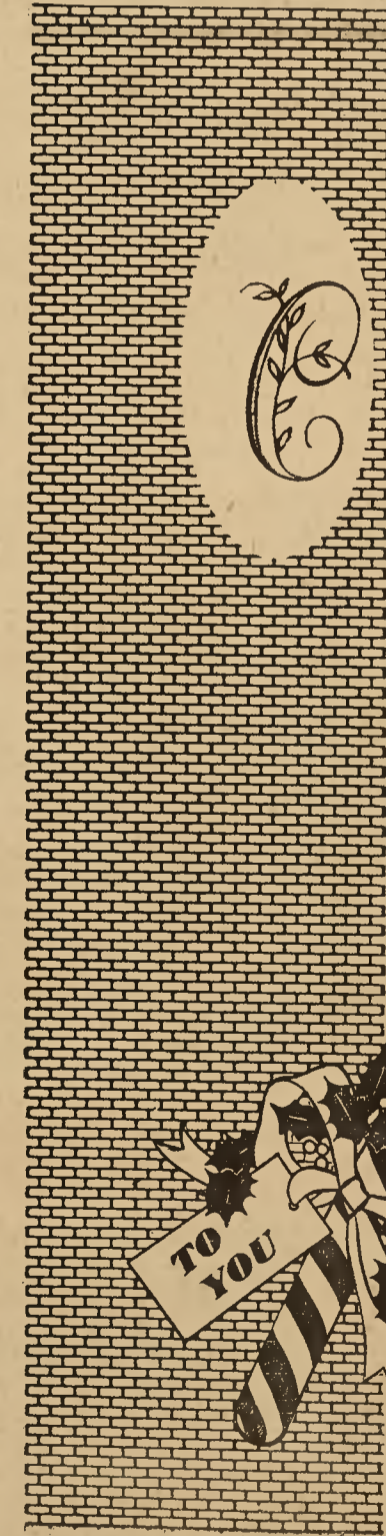
