George Says Patriots Organization Has Changed Opinion To Segregation

Prof. W. Critz George, retiring President of the pro-segregation Patriots of North Carolina, Inc., today credited this year-old organization with "materially changing the sentiment" of the state to oppose the Supreme Court's public school integration edict.

Prof. George, teacher of histology and embryology in the University Medical School, stepped down as leader of the Patriots on Saturday when the 60-man board of directors met here to choose a new executive committee and officers for the coming year. However, he was elected to the 15-member executive group and said he would continue to remain active in the organization.

Cries Accomplishment
"I think our group has accomplished a great deal," Prof. George said. "It is in large measure due to our efforts, I feel, that the sentiment in this state on the integration question has changed so materially. Two years ago the general feeling was that there was nothing that could be done about the integration order. That feeling is not so prevalent today."

He added that he felt the tide of public opinion was continuing to turn more toward the side of segregation. The need for the Patriots organization will continue as long as the integration question (See GEORGE, Page 6)

Case That Touched Off "Ugly Club" Affair Brings \$50 Fine To Student At University

A \$50 fine on traffic charges against a University senior from Danville, Va., has brought to a close the notorious "Ugly Club" case of police station vandalism here last spring.

Judge William S. Stewart in Recorder's Court found Hosea Wilson, 21, guilty of reckless driving, speeding, and making an improper turn, and fined the defendant \$50 and court costs after he pleaded guilty to all three charges. Wilson was acquitted on a drunken driving charge, to which he pleaded no guilty.

Record Vote Of Nearly 10,000 Is Seen In Orange County For General Elections

Lone Republican Listed On Local Ballot; Latta Says Absentee Voting Is Heavy

Swelled registration rolls, increased requests for absentee ballots and fever-pitch campaigning by presidential aspirants in the forthcoming national election indicate tomorrow's General Election in Orange County will see the largest vote of local record.

This was the opinion today of elections officials and political leaders of both parties as campaigning moved down the home stretch for tomorrow's big test.

Registration books were closed following a heavy pre-election registration in almost all of the county precincts. In Chapel Hill and Carrboro alone, a total of 1,009 were added to the six precinct voting lists to bring the total number registered to 7,770, and an overall increase of 13 percent. Other precincts were swelled to their highest registration of record, and an estimated 15,000 citizens are eligible to vote if they want to.

Just 31 short of 9,000 Orange County voters cast ballots for Eisenhower and Stevenson in 1952 and predictions on the increase by some observers go as high as 15% for 1956. Best guess seems a vote of 9,500.

Canine Controversy . . . Dog Dilemma Keeps Board In A Dither

An un-vaccinated, un-licensed, and un-tax-listed Chapel Hill dog that bit a telephone lineman was the topic of an hour-long discussion in the County Commissioners meeting in Hillsboro this morning.

The canine, belonging to Mrs. Susie Smith of Merritt Mill Road, bit Chapel Hill Telephone Co. lineman Bob Rush on Oct. 13 and was held thereafter captured—with great difficulty—by County Dog Warden Cashe Boggs.

In Pound Since Then
He has had the animal in the County Dog Pound since then. The Board was told this morning that the dog's owner said she would not have the animal vaccinated. The commissioners directed that it be placed on the tax books, and directed Warden Boggs to confer with the County Attorney as to possible action in the case.

Commissioner Edwin S. Lanier of Chapel Hill suggested that Mrs. Smith was "defying constituted authority" and added that he resented "squandering tax money" to keep the dog at the pound. He suggested that the dog be destroyed if all taxes were not paid and vaccinations taken care of by Friday.

Other Business
The Board also directed that a refund of \$55.43 be made to W. M. McCauley for 1954 taxes paid on his W. Franklin St., Chapel Hill property which was double-listed.

Alex McMahon, Chairman of the Greater Chapel Hill Fire District, received approval from the commissioners for a clarification of the Fire District boundary in an area of the Airport development where property owners have been paying the district fire tax.

Three Passengers
Wilson was the driver, the patrolman said, and appeared to be under the influence of an intoxicating beverage. There were three other passengers in the car.

Testifying in his own behalf, Wilson said he and his passengers had just left their dates for the evening at a sorority house and did not know they were speeding, and thought the U-turn would be all right but late at night Wilson presented the Danville police chief as a character witness.

Four Teen-Agers Are Charged In Halloween Assault On Two

A Halloween affray has brought assault charges by two University students against four Chapel Hill teen-agers.

Police Capt. William D. Blake and Sgt. Coy E. Durham revealed this morning that the warrants had been sworn out against Pat Burns Jr., 19, of Carrboro, his 16-year-old brother Tommie Burns, Johnnie Vickers, 19, of Route Three, and Ronnie Vick, of Chapel Hill.

Two UNC Students
The charges were brought in connection with a 10:15 p.m. fight in front of Sloan's Drugstore by William W. Winters, UNC sophomore from Spring Lake, and Robert S. Ward, graduate student from Fayetteville.

Sgt. Durham said the Police Department had received complaints earlier in the evening on Halloween about pedestrians being pelted with eggs and wet paper wads in the vicinity of the downtown drugstore.

He said that the two University students told him that they were walking past the drugstore through a large group of boys when one of them was hit by a wad of paper. As they turned, the officer related, the students said, they were "jumped" by some of those in the group.

Students Injured
In the ensuing fight Ward sustained a broken nose, a severe bruise on the back of his head, and a cut inside his lip that required four stitches to treat.

The cases are scheduled for trial in Recorder's Court tomorrow.

District Jaycees Open Drive To Run Cox For National Post

A move to draft State Jaycees President Bob Cox as a national vice-president of the U. S. Jaycees has been started by unanimous action of the Fifth District of the Tar Heel young men's civic group.

The motion was made by Ed Miller, President of the High Point Jaycees, at the meeting of the 13 clubs in the eight-county district at High Point on Thursday evening, and it was unanimously carried. Mr. Cox was not present at the meeting.

The 10 national vice-presidents will be elected at next June's annual convention of the U. S. Junior Chamber in Milwaukee, Wis. Mr. Cox has been successively President of the Chapel Hill Jaycees, District Vice-President, a national director, and now, State President.
