Farm Agent's Column

DAIRYMEN TO MEET JANUARY 7
All grade A dairymen who are
not keeping records through D.H.I.
A. or Owner-sampler systems are
invited to attend a meeting to be
held Monday, January 7th at 2
o'clock in the old courthouse in
Hillsboro.

Marvin Senger, State College
Dairy Specialist in Charge of Dairy
Records, will explain the new Weigh-
A-Day-A-Month plan, and start the
system work in Orange County.
This plan is a nationwide in scope,
and is being sponsored by the U. S.
Department of Agriculture through
the County Agents. It is the most
inexpensive of the three systems.
The dairymen pay sixty cents per
quart in advance and agree to
weigh the morning and evening
milk from each cow on the
fifteenth of each month. This rec-
ord is sent in to the county office
and summarized. The production of
each cow is computed and a table
of amount of feed each cow
receives is furnished monthly to
the dairymen.

All dairy authorities are agreed
that production records must be
kept in order to manage a dairy
herd efficiently.

FERTILIZATION WITHOUT SOIL
TEST WASTEFUL

Professor William F. Bennett of
Iowa State College says buying a
fertilizer for \$50 without first
soil test is like purchasing
of medicine without first
consulting your doctor.

For best results from a soil man-
agement program, each field should
be tested made once every
three years. Mailing cartons are
available at the County Agents of-
fice.

TO STUDY VARIETIES
With the black listing of some
of the most popular tobacco varie-
ties, farmers are making every ef-
fort to learn all there is to know
about the different available varie-
ties. This information will be given
at a tobacco meeting to be held
at Aycock School in Cedar Grove
Thursday night, January 3rd, at
7:30 o'clock. Representatives from
State College, the Oxford Experi-
ment Station, and the Stabilization
Cooperative will lead the discussion.

ASC Sign-Up
Period Opens
On January 3

The Orange County Technical
Committee has selected a list of
practices it considers best suited
for Orange County.

The Orange County ASC person-
nel will begin taking applications
for these practices on January 3,
and continue to accept applications
through January 20.

Following is a list of practices
selected for Orange County with a
brief description of each.

1. Permanent Pasture or Hay: This practice is for the initial establishment of a permanent vegetative cover for soil protection or a needed land use adjustment.
2. Additional Vegetative Cover In Crop Rotation: This practice is for the establishment of additional coverage of vegetative cover in crop rotation to retard erosion and to improve soil structure, permeability or water holding capacity.
3. Liming Materials on Farmland: This practice is for the initial treatment of farmland to permit the use of legumes and grasses for soil improvement and protection.
4. Forest Tree Planting: This practice is for the initial establishment of a stand of trees of farmland for erosion control, watershed protection, or forestry purposes.
5. Permanent Pasture or Hay Improvement: This practice is for the improvement of an established permanent vegetative cover for soil or watershed protection.
6. Farm Ponds As A Means Of Protecting Vegetative Cover Or For Irrigation Water: This practice is for the construction of farm ponds as a means of protecting vegetative cover or for irrigation water.
7. Forest Improvement: This practice is for the improvement or establishment of stand of forest trees for erosion control, watershed protection, or forestry purposes.
8. Sod Waterways: This practice is for the initial establishment of permanent sod waterways to disperse excess water without causing erosion.
9. Terracing: This practice is for the construction of terraces to define or control the flow of water and check soil erosion.

Prospects For New Year Bright
Despite Low Spots In Economy

Prospects for continued prosperity throughout the nation during 1957 are bright despite sectional low spots in our economy, according to a majority of the nation's economists and business prognosticators.

Indications are that business will continue to expand operations and plant facilities, though to a somewhat lesser degree than in 1956, and it is expected that employment will continue high. It is expected that there will be a gradual rise in prices and a continued mild expansion of our economy.

Tobacco farmers in the bluecrossed growing states will be hard hit by a 20 per cent reduction in tobacco acreage, but a part of this decrease in income is expected to be offset somewhat by the soil bank program. In addition, many farmers will turn to other crops and a live-at-home program to cushion the shock of a severe reduction in acreage.

The government is expected to continue its "tight" money policy during the first six months of the year to prevent too fast an ex-
