 as proposed, since they are already drawing more than the salary would be even after the suggested raises, and would be frozen at this salary by the job classification pay limits. The employees group has sent to the General Assembly a petition signed by 1,040 local workers, asking that only an across-the-board direct pay increase be given.

#### Hodges' Statement

Gov. Hodges has said in endorsing the Personnel Department plan that about 98 per cent of all state employees would receive raises. The local spokesman said that most of the remaining two per cent were UNC employees. Of this particular category, Gov. Hodges said "To this last-mentioned group, I recommend that the Appropriations Committees give special consideration, taking into account the actual rise in the cost of living and consistent insofar as possible with the Personnel Council's suggested plan."

### Wildcats Win Third In Row

Upbeaten Chapel Hill High had to push across an unearned run in the seventh inning here Tuesday afternoon to edge out winless Southern High of Durham, 5-4.

This afternoon Chapel Hill will play Roxboro there, and next Tuesday, Northern here.

The Wildcats pulled the game out of the fire when two Southern outfielders, Ronnie Gardner and Ted Garrett, collided on a fly ball by Eddie Clark. The winning run scored from second base on the play.

Coach Fred Smith's Southern team, despite the wildness of Wayne Bowen, managed to take a 3-1 lead in the early innings and then roar back to tie it up in the sixth after Chapel Hill scored three times in the fifth.

Bowen walked 12 batters before he was relieved in the fifth inning. The burly victory went to Gordon Neville, Chapel Hill's brilliant all-around athlete, who struck out 13 and allowed only four hits.

The Wildcats managed only two hits, but took advantage of Bowen's wildness to win the game.

Scholarship awards have been announced for five local students—Martha Adams, Jerry Hocutt, Edward Hotelling, Joanna Scroggs, and Chips Weaver.

Miss Adams, a junior at Chapel Hill High School and daughter of Prof. and Mrs. J. Edison Adams, has been given an American Field

Service exchange student grant for a trip to Europe this summer. She will leave in June, along with other similar award winners over the nation, after an orientation program in New York. While her destination has not been settled, she hopes to spend about six weeks in Italy.
