Five candidates will also be in the running for four seats on the Chapel Hill District School Board in a separate election on the same day. Deadline for candidates filing in the municipal voting expired on Monday, 15 days before the election, as required by

Registration Deadline

The final day for registration of new voters for both elections will be this Saturday, when registrars will be in the precinct polling places all day. As of last Saturday a total of 1,358 persons are listed as qualified voters on the Town books. This number plus an additional 35 registrants in the School District outside of Town are eligible to vote in the School Board election.

A total of 258 new voters were registered for the Town elections as the poll books were opened last Saturday, and more than that number are expected to sign in this Saturday.
