

## Notice To All Local Voters

YOU ARE REGISTERED TO VOTE IN THE MAY 7 CHAPEL HILL TOWN AND SCHOOL DISTRICT ELECTIONS IF —

- (1) You are already a registered voter in the Town of Chapel Hill and—
  - (a) If you were eligible to vote in the Town elections—for Mayor, Alderman, Judge—in 1955.
  - (b) NOTE: There was a complete re-registration for all voters in the Town of Chapel Hill in 1953. Any person who did not re-register then or since then is not eligible to vote in Chapel Hill.
- (2) Registration and eligibility for the GENERAL ELECTIONS (national) last fall does not make a voter eligible to vote in the Chapel Hill election on May 7. Registration for the RECREATION DISTRICT ELECTION on April 2 does not make a voter eligible to vote in the Chapel Hill election on May 7. Registration and voting in last year's CHAPEL HILL ANNEXATION ELECTION does not make a voter eligible to vote in the Chapel Hill election on May 7. Registration and voting in the SCHOOL BOND AND FIRE DISTRICT ELECTIONS last year do NOT make ANY voter eligible to vote in the Chapel Hill election on May 7.

These above-noted elections all concerned different political sub-divisions. The elections were not held by the Town of Chapel Hill, nor for the Chapel Hill Special School District.

### THEREFORE—

If you are a resident of the Town of Chapel Hill, or of the Chapel Hill Special School District, and your name is not now on the registration books of the TOWN or of the SCHOOL DISTRICT—

YOU WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE TO VOTE IN THE TOWN AND SCHOOL DISTRICT ELECTIONS ON MAY 7

This coming Saturday, April 27, is the final day for registration of new voters for these two elections. Registrars will be in the precinct polling places as follows to accept registrations:

**NORTH PRECINCT**—All territory north of Franklin St. and Durham Rd., Chapel Hill Town Hall, Mrs. Henry Royall, Registrar.

**SOUTH PRECINCT**—All territory south of Franklin St. and Durham Rd. and inside of the bypass highway; Woolen Gymnasium lobby; Mrs. A. T. Miller, Registrar.

**FAST PRECINCT**—All territory inside the Town of Chapel Hill or inside the School District, south or east of the bypass highway (U.S. 15-501).

NOTE: Registrars will accept new registrations at their homes between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. tomorrow (Friday, April 26), in cases of persons who will be unable to register on Saturday.

### REGISTRATION HOURS THIS SATURDAY:

For the School Election — 9 a.m. - sunset.  
For the Town Election — 9 a.m. - 9 p.m.

It is recommended that all persons who think they are already registered and eligible for the Town election check with the precinct registrars to verify this fact.

## Third Candidate In Carrboro Board Race

### Sturdivant Files But McLaughlin Still Has Not Announced

A third candidate, incumbent Gene Sturdivant, filed this week for the three seats to be elected on the Carrboro Board of Town Commissioners in the May 6 biennial municipal voting.

Mr. Sturdivant, 43, is a resident of 407 S. Greensboro St. and a salesman for the University Laundry. He is seeking his second term on the Board. A local resident for the past 23 years, Mr. Sturdivant is married, has two daughters, and is also a trustee of the Carrboro Methodist Church.

**Another Incumbent**  
Another incumbent seeking re-election is E. O. "Bill" Hardee, Chairman of the Board's Streets and Finance Committees. Mr. Hardee, 45, has served five terms as a commissioner since 1939.

First person to declare his candidacy for the Board was Harold Dark, 38-year-old University employee. John McLaughlin, the other incumbent whose seat is up for election, had not declared his intentions as of this morning.

Registration of new voters will continue in the Town Hall on Lloyd St., from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. tomorrow and from 9 a.m. until 9 p.m. on Saturday.

**Todd Vs. Brookbank**  
In the Mayoral race R. B. Todd, now completing his first term in office, is being opposed by G. C. Brookbank, a retired construction superintendent.

In connection with his candidacy Mr. Brookbank today issued the following statement:

"Not until after Mayor Todd made the statement that he would not be a candidate for re-election to the office of Mayor of Carrboro and not until many of my friends requested it did I decide to run for this office, subject to the election on May 6.

"If the voters see fit to elect me as Mayor of Carrboro it will be my earnest endeavor to serve as efficiently as I know how. I promise that I will not be unduly

## Carl Durham Back Home For A Few Days Respite

Home for only the second time since the current session of Congress convened last winter, Rep. Carl Durham has been trying to catch up on his relaxing this week.

Although Congress won't reconvene until next Monday, the Sixth District solon expected he'd have to head back to Capitol Hill before the weekend because of the press of the affairs of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy, of which he's a charter member and the Chairman.

**Additional Jobs**  
As if just attending to the affairs of his own district and participating in the regular meetings of Congress weren't enough, Rep. Durham has taken on two additional jobs this session—both of which bid to be full-time propositions.

He's continuing on the House Armed Services Committee as one of its senior members, and has sponsored more than two-dozen bills out of this body to date

this year.

Of course his main job is as Chairman of the joint atomic energy body—an all-powerful agency that's watchdog over the Atomic Energy Commission. This year the country's atomic energy program embodies a two billion dollar budget. Rep. Durham noted he didn't "see how the figure could be reduced" in the coming year.

### Has Extra Staff

The constantly-expanding peaceful and military uses of atomic energy are daily demanding further administration and more time from the joint Congressional committee. While Rep. Durham has only three persons on his regular office staff he has a special aide for his Armed Services Committee work and the atomic energy committee has a staff of over 80.

**His new post as Committee Chairman demands far more traveling around the country — both on official Committee hear-**

### Saturday Is Final Day For Registration; Mayor Is Unopposed

A field of 10 candidates will seek public offices in the Chapel Hill Town elections on May 7.

Five candidates will also be in the running for four seats on the Chapel Hill District School Board in a separate election on the same day. Deadline for candidates filing in the municipal voting expired on Monday, 15 days before the election, as required by law.

### Registration Deadline

The final day for registration of new voters for both elections will be this Saturday, when registrars will be in the precinct polling places all day. As of last Saturday a total of 1,358 persons are listed as qualified voters on the Town books. This number plus an additional 35 registrants in the School District outside of Town are eligible to vote in the School Board election.

A total of 258 new voters were registered for the Town elections as the poll books were opened last Saturday, and more than that number are expected to sign in this Saturday.

Here is the line-up of candidates that will face voters on election day: For Mayor, O. K. Cornwell, running for his second full term of two years, is unopposed.

### Two For Judge

For Judge of the Recorder's Court, incumbent William S. Stewart is being opposed for a fourth two-year term by attorney Harold Edwards.

There are seven candidates for the four seats at stake on the Board of Aldermen. Incumbents Hubert Robinson, Paul Wager, Clyde Hornaday and Kenneth Putnam, are seeking re-election.

In addition, Roland Giduz, Bill Hobbs, and Mrs. Harold Walters are in the running. The top four persons in vote standings will be declared elected—the first three for four-year terms, and the fourth for an interim two-year term.

Deadline for the School Board candidates' filing expired on March 30. There are five persons seeking the four seats at stake on the six-

Some of the possible questions which have been mentioned for the potential Aldermen are: need for additional traffic routes within the town so that all areas will be more easily accessible; administration of Chapel Hill's zoning ordinances; parallel parking and parking meters in the business district; elimination of parking on congested streets.

Questions to School Board candidates may include such matters as integration policy; use of the supplementary school tax; wider community use of school buildings; need for supervisory services in the teaching of art, music, physical education; basic subjects in the school program versus "frills" like art, music, and physical education.

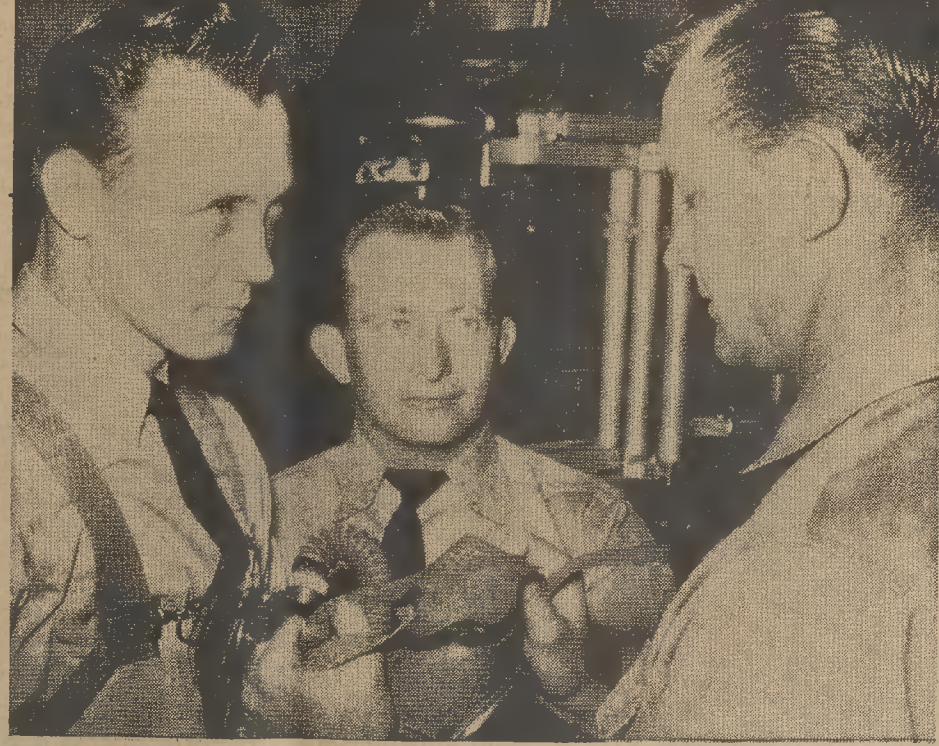
