

#### **Budget Analysis**

An analysis of the current school year budget was given by Dean Henry Brandis of the University Law School, a School Board member, He pointed out that state and federal funds account for 70 per cent of school monies. The rest comes from local sources. Chapel Hill is now getting "almost a half-million dollars year for operating expenses," he stated

"About \$130,000 of this money was raised locally," Dean Brandis said. "The University provided \$11,000, the County \$47,000 and the local 15 cent tax supplement provided \$52,-000." The rest of the money came from a \$21,800 bank balance of July 1, 1957. "It seems certain we will not have anything near that balance at the end of this fiscal year," he said.
