University Enrollment Is 7,513

Fall enrollment at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill totals 7,513 students, indicating a 7 per cent increase over last year and a 30 per cent increase in the past six years, Central Records said yesterday.

Total enrollment on the central campus here is 6,414, including graduates and undergraduates. Enrollment in the Division of Health Affairs is 1,099 students.

Most of the students are from North Carolina, the in-state total being 5,725. There are students from 44 states and the District of Columbia. Thirty-nine foreign nations are represented in the student body at Chapel Hill, with 104 students from foreign lands registered.

After North Carolina the largest number of out-of-state students comes from Virginia, a total of 229 Virginians being enrolled. Next is New York with 195 students at UNC, and after that South Carolina with 124, New Jersey with 122, Pennsylvania with 110, Georgia with 109, and Maryland with 93.

Men students number 5,979. There are 1,534 women students. The largest enrollment, as usual in the General College, the freshmen and sophomore years, with 2,569 registered. There are 1,342 freshmen. Next in numbers is the College of Arts and Sciences, chiefly juniors and seniors, with 1,379 enrolled.

The School of Business Administration reports enrollment of 502 students; the School of Education 422; School of Journalism 50 students.

A total of 1,118 students are in the Graduate School. That does not include 115 graduates in public health, 46 in Library Science, and bringing the total number of graduate 55 in Social Work, which would students to 1,334.

Law School enrollment is 252 students. Total Library Science enrollment is 62 and the total in Social Work is 60.

In the Division of Health Affairs the largest enrollment is in the four-year School of Medicine, with 269 enrolled. There are 245 enrolled in the School of Pharmacy, School of Dentistry registration totals 218, and the School of Nursing 211.

Of the 117 now in the University, 107 are from North Carolina public schools, 30 are graduates of North Carolina senior colleges, 29 are from out of state prep schools, nine from North Carolina junior colleges, and four from North Carolina state prep schools.

There are 31 students in the current University freshman class under Morehead scholarships, and one junior college graduate.

Mr. Armstrong told the Exchangers that Mr. Morehead originated the scholarship program in 1951 "to increase the distinction of the University. He doesn't care if the recipient is a pauper or a millionaire, as long as he has real ability."

Since its inception in 1951, the foundation has awarded 179 scholarships with a financial outlay of \$800,000.

Carrboro Boy's Arrest Solves Wave Of Thefts

Arrest of a 16-year-old Carrboro boy by Sheriff's Deputies Earl Bush and Paul Cook Saturday afternoon cleared up a long series of robberies extending over a period of time.

He is Earl Brewer, who admitted entering locker rooms of Woolen Gymnasium several times stealing clothes, watches, billfolds and other personal belongings, as well as numerous thefts from parked cars on Chapel Hill streets, clothes from a Burlington store and an auto in Burlington. A juvenile from Burlington was also involved in some of the thefts.

Suspicion was directed to the boy when Chapel Hill police made a routine driver's license check on the Brewer boy and noted that the billfold and license presented carried the name of a Jamerson boy whose billfold and license had been reported stolen earlier. When Brewer was later identified and questioned by the Sheriff's deputies he admitted the series of thefts.
