

Concert Series Member Drive Seats Said 'Going Very Well'

Mrs. Lawrence London, membership chairman for the Chapel Hill Concert Series, said today that that "seats are going very well" in the group's pre-season selling drive.

Mrs. London said that "some very good ones" are still available, however.

First artist on the local unit's series will be Leonard Warren, famous baritone of the Metropolitan Opera. He will appear in concert at Memorial Hall Oct. 6.

Mr. Warren launched his current season this month with the San Francisco Opera, with appearances in three of his greatest roles, Scarpia in "Tosca," which won him ovations at the Met last season. "Simon Boccanegra" and "Falstaff." He will begin his Metropolitan season in the much-awaited revival of "Ernani" and will also sing in "Tosca," "Traviata," "Il Trovatore" and "Rigoletto."

The singer, called "the world's finest dramatic baritone" by magazines, will appear this year on such

top radio and television shows as "The Telephone Hour" and was one of the galaxy of stars on last January's NBC-S. Hurok Spectacular "Festival of Music." His large catalogue of RCA-Victor recordings are among the industry's most admired.

Born in New York City, Warren reached the Met through the Auditions of the Air. After six-months' study in Italy, he made his debut in 1939 and rose through minor roles to dominate the company's baritone roster. In the 1953-1954 season he won wide acclaim in his debut at Milan's La Scala, and he also sang for six consecutive seasons in Buenos Aires' Teatro Colon and in the Teatro Municipal in Rio de Janeiro.
