Chapel Hill-Carrboro Recreation, Inc. on Oct. 20 will consider the proposal of John Umstead, Jr., for the donation of an additional three

acres of land providing the group

builds a "suitable" recreation

"Suitable," according to Rev. Charles Hubbard, president of the association, "means one big enough for the community to use."

The additional acreage would increase to almost 10 acres the number available to the association for construction of a recreation center. Mr. Umstead also

donated initial acreage. At a meeting last week, mem bers of the executive committee and Mr. Umstead concurred on the idea that plans for the center were not adequate for the community. Mr. Umstead told the group that it was his suggestion to build a building twice the size of one currently being planned. When the problem of financing the plan was made, Mr. Umstead suggested acquisition of a loan.

The proposed building is expected to cost around \$75,000. At the meeting last week, it was disclosed that the group has \$20,000 in the bank, \$12,000 is still outstanding in pledges, and \$10,000

additional is to be raised. 'Ideal' For Diamond

The proposed building for the site would be 8,800 square feet. Rev. Hubbard said the site is also "ideal" for a Little League and softball diamond. He said the local Kiwanis club has agreed to put up a professional - type backstop if they can spend the money on it before the end of their fiscal year

The proposed building's main floor includes pians for a 4,500square-foot ballroom, a kitchen, two club rooms, a snack room, a large lobby, a crafts room, an office, a check room and rest rooms. A lower floor will be an open 342 square-foot activities room, with fireplace.

Rev. Hubbard said that the contract for the building should be let between now and the first of the year and the building completed, possibly, by next June.
