## ABC Store Opposition Forming

Organized opposition to the entrance of ABC stores into Orange County seems to be forming.

"Everyone who is opposed" to the sale of alcoholic beverages in the county has been invited to attend a "citizens' meeting" Friday.

According to Carolyn F. Noell, a member of the group, the meeting

will start at 7:30 p.m. in the basement of the University Baptist Church.

Plans will be mapped at that time for activities to fight the ABC stores.

The Friday meeting was preceded last week by another meeting held by opponents of the ABC establishment. According to officials, the "major achievement" of the first meeting was to "de-

pose a system of contacting some persons in each community in the Chapel Hill-Hillsboro area."

It was noted that while contacts are being made primarily through churches, the new "dry" organization is not church-sponsored. "Rather," according to a spokesman, "we are a group of citizens interested in the issue."

The Orange County Board of Com-

missioners in September set Feb. 3 for holding of an A. B. C. election in the county, after first setting Feb. 7. According to the commissioners, the date was changed so that it might be held prior to convening, on Feb. 4, of the State Legislature.

No vote on the Establishment of ABC stores has been held in the county since the mid 1930s, following the adoption of the North Carolina local option law.

## 23 UNC Student Instructors Begin Work In Orange Schools

Chapel Hill's Board of Aldermen will meet tonight at Town Hall, starting at 7:30. One of the many items of business concerns an appeal from Chapel Hill High School students for free parking time.

Paul Houston, editor of the school newspaper, the Proconian, will represent the school group, which seeks the free time during school hours in an area in front of the school which has been staffed with parking meters.

Automobiles which used to line the school parking spot have been conspicuous by their absence since the area was metered last week.

The aldermen are also to hear, among other things, a report on the proposed new fire station in

the Glen Lennox area, an ordinance restricting the use of banners in the downtown area, and a report on paving assessments.

The high school delegation will bear a petition signed by 300 persons asking for the free time. Heading the group, besides Houston, will be Miss May Marshbanks, principal, Subir Roy, student body president, and Anne Prescott, who originated the petition.

According to the student paper, students have retreated to nearby parking lots since the meters came in.

## Parking Meters 'Complaints' Levelling Seen

The Chapel Hill Police Dept. has been deluged with complaints from local residents about parking meters after the first week of operation.

But Chief of Police Bill Blake said today that he feels the complaints, "mostly by persons who parked their car briefly to 'run into the store' and then got caught" will level off this week.

Chief Blake reminded motorists that his department has a fulltime man policing the town's 400 new meters. He also noted that "just running into a store" didn't exempt motorists from paying for the time to park.

Chief Blake said he did not know how merchants felt about the new meters, but that he believed it actually helps them.

"Just look at all the parking spaces now available," he said.
