Boost In Army TODAY—TUESDAY Goal Possible

Secretary Tells Senate The Figures May Have To Be Hiked

EXPLAINS REDUCTION

Undersecretary of War Robert P Patterson told a Senate committee day Friday that the army's goal of 7,700,000 in uniform by the end of the year "may have to be increased."

An upward revision would mean a heavier draft of pre-Pearl Harbor fathers than is now contemplated. Selective service officials have estimated 446,000 will have to be called to meet the current goal.

Patterson mentioned the possibility of a boost in the Army5s planned size in testimony before the Byrd committee, inquiring into the War depart-ment's fiscal affairs and civilian employment. He recalled that an Army of 8,200,000 by the end of this year originally was planned, but the program was scaled down to 7,700,000 after the African victories.

This cut was made, he said, without prejudice to the authority of General George C. Marshall, the chief of staff, to reinstate the original
