German Army Held Firmly In Steel Vise By Allied Troops

FIGHTING FOR BIG PORT

British and Canadian forces caught the prize inland port of Gaen in a steel miteracker last night resolving within four miles southwest of the city in the greatest tank battle of the Normandy invasion and pressing down from the north and northeast at distances of two to three miles.

A headquarters communique late Wednesday night announced continuing progress in spite of more bad weather and intense opposition.

Both infantry and armored forces cracked through the German's Odon river line on a two-mile-wide front south of Tourville, the communique said, adding: "Our advance continued toward high ground south of the Odon."

German forces have halted their flight in central Italy and are mak-ing a bitte retand against the Allied Enghth Army on both sides of Lake Trasimeno, about 85 miles north and

(A broadcast by CBS said the Nazis had counterattacked strongly and recaptured the town of Chiust, nine miles southwest of Lake Trasimeno and 25 miles southwest of Perugia.)

Heavy rains have given the Germans a much-needed breathing spell in which to reorganize and strengthen their defenses at the center of the line, and it appeared they would not be thrown into retreat again until the Eighth Army could gather itself and attack in force.

The Allied communique said the Eighth was meeting "strong resistance" both north and northwest of Perugia and at the southwest corner of Lake Trasimeno, where several enemy counterattacks had been repulsed.

Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force—The Germans were reported today to have thrown the bulk of their 15th and 17th Armies into the defense of Caen in an aftempt to half the British fianking thrust south of the inland port. But Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery's men amashed nine osunter-attacks in 24 hours and widened a breach in the enemy lines. Supreme Headquarters announced British infantry and armor were streaming across the Odon River southwest of Caen in an ever-widening bridgehead.

Supreme Command Gives **Total Casualties As 24,162** In Two Weeks

CAPTURE 32,000 NAZIS

The Supreme Command announced yesterday that the first two weeks of the European invasion cost the Allies 40,549 casualties, including 24,162 Americans killed, wounded and missing—figures that still do not include last week's losses in the Cherbourg assault or the start of the present British offensive in the Caen area.

Of the casualty total for the period from June 6 to June 20, inclusive, 5,-287 were killed—of which 3,062 were Americans, 1,842 British and 363 Canadians. The Supreme Command annous

Against these Allied losses German casualties in Normandy through the fall of Cherbourg have been estimated by Supreme Headquarters at not less than 70,000 men.
