MR. BENTON NEARLY KILLED IN A WRECK

OH Tanker Flies Through Air And Hits Wagon; Mrs. Couck Hurt. Tommy R. Benton was seriously injured about one o'clock Monday afternoon when a gasoline tanker got out of control on the highway near Indian Trail, near several feet through the air and landed on the wagon in which he was riding.

Mr. Benton was carried to Monroe and then taken to Charlotte where it is said he is suffering from a fractured neck and head injuries. Willie Miller, colored, also in the wagon, was struck and seriously injured.

The driver of the tanker, Orelle Earl Godwin, was not injured and is in jail on a charge of reckless driving, pending the outcome of Mr. Benton's injuries. The two mules were skinned up some, the wagon was demolished, and the tanker was badly damaged.

The empty tanker was coming toward Monroe, witnesses told Corp. J. B. Boyd who investigated, and the wagon was also coming toward Monroe. A truck was meeting the wagon and when the driver of the tanker put on his brakes, the trailer jack-knifed and struck a pole beside the road. It then flew into the air, passed over the cab of the approaching truck which had stopped at the edge of the highway, and landed on the wagon.

The impact threw Mr. Benton into a field and the colored man and the two mules were caught under the truck and had to be rescued. The truck was not touched, the tanker going at least ten feet in the air.

Another serious accident took place about 10 o'clock Monday morning when Mrs. Frank Couck was struck by a truck just after she stepped off a bus near Jackson school. She was badly broken and is in a serious condition in a Charlotte hospital. The driver of the truck, Tony Robinson, Jr., of Charlotte, was placed under \$1,000 bond by Patrolman Greene on a charge of reckless driving.

FARMERS URGED TO SAVE GRASS AND LEGUME SEED There is still time to avert a serious threat to livestock and conservation programs by harvesting every available pound of grass and legume seed, J. Hoyle Biggers, chairman of the Union county agricultural conservation association said today.

"Red Clover can be harvested on through September and the period for alfalfa seed stretches from August to October."

"There's no use beating around the bush on this question of legume and grass seeds. The cold facts are, unless we beat the seed shortage, we are headed for serious trouble."

Mr. Biggers called attention to a supplemental Congressional appropriation of \$12,500,000 for use under the program of the Agricultural Adjustment Agency in meeting the grass and legume seed shortage. Payments from this fund, he said will provide farmers with a cash incentive to insure production of the needed seed.

Under the AAA program farmers had been offered a payment ranging up to \$3.50 per acre—up to 25 acres—for harvesting specified grass and legume seeds. This provision has been amended to remove the 25-acre limitation, and payments will be made for every acre harvested. In addition, special poundage payments of 2 1/2 cents per pound, clean basis, will be made for Red Clover seed, and 2 1/2 cents per pound for alfalfa clover and alfalfa seed. All these payments are in addition to Government-subsidized market prices.

"We had serious seed shortages before," Mr. Biggers declared, "and they have caused us a great deal of difficulty. In fact, the first Congressional appropriation ever made for the benefit of agriculture had to do with seeds. This most recent appropriation may make it possible to harvest as an additional two million acres of seeds to be harvested. It's up to us farmers to do the job."

U. S. wheat production is estimated at 1,700,000 bushels, the largest crop in history.
