Shoe Rationing News

Airplane Stamp No. 3 in Ration Book No. 3 becomes valid for shoes on Wednesday, November 1st. Airplane Stamps Nos. 1 and 2 are good indefinitely.

Stamps must be presented in the book as "Rationing Regulations prohibit us from accepting loose ration stamps for shoes selected or delivered in the store."

You may use a loose ration stamp for bona fide mail order. That is an order for a pair of shoes which you have not selected at the store.

In case you return a pair of shoes a special refund stamp is given you. This stamp is good for the same time that your original stamp was.

SHOES TO MEMBERS OF THE ARMED FORCES OVERSEAS

You can send shoes to any one overseas without using your Ration Stamps. Get a request from the soldier, bring this request to us and leave with us until the shoes are mailed. We will then return your letter. This is a special regulation designed to get shoes to the boys over sea without any member of their family using a ration stamp.
