Wide Variety Of Foods Will Be Plentiful During March

The U. S. Dept. of Agriculture's list of foods expected to be plentiful in March includes a wide variety, with grapefruit, Irish potatoes, cabbage, and celery leading the field.

The grapefruit crop, estimated at 44,320,000 boxes, runs about 5-960,000 boxes larger than a year ago, and the quality is excellent.

New crop Florida potatoes will hit March markets in increasing volume, adding to the large supplies from the fall harvest. Prices to producers have been well below last year's levels.

As for cabbage, though the winter crop is expected to reach about 327,000 tons—approximately 3 per cent below the average for the past four years—first-of-January stocks of Danish cabbage, estimated at 60,500 tons, were double the quantity on hand for this date in 1953.

Winter celery production is estimated at around 6,862,900 crates—3 per cent above the average for the past four years.

Here's thumbnail information on some of the other plentiful:

Beef: Offerings of high quality beef should be in liberal supply, along with the less expensive intermedia and grades.

Broilers And Fryers: Around 10 per cent more birds are nearing the marketable age than a year ago. Wholesale prices continue moderate.

Eggs: December production was a record 5.3 billion, and a higher rate of laying is expected to increase production over last year.

Fresh And Processed Orange: The record 1953 crop in Florida—forecast at 86,000,000 boxes—is about 13,800,000 boxes larger than in 1952.

Winter Peas: Production is estimated at 7,130,000 boxes—around a million boxes above the previous season.

Raisins: Heavy carryover, plus 1953 output, assures ample supplies.

Cranberry Sauce: This season's crop broke all records, and supplies for processing were about 50 per cent larger than a year earlier.

Onions: Total storage holdings are up 61 per cent from a year ago, and new crop onions from South Texas will soon begin moving.

Dairy Products: A greater-than-seasonal increase in milk production in the first half of last year lifted stored dairy products to new levels.

Household Hints

OLD VARNISH
When refinishing the furniture, put 3 tablespoonsful of cooking soda into one quart of water and apply with rough cloth. Then use sandpaper and the varnish will come off easily.

FUDGE
When making fudge, if a small spoonful of corns arch is added it will greatly improve both the texture and the flavor of the candy.

LINOLEUM VARNISH
To make a varnish for linoleum, melt a small amount of glue in a pint of water. Have the linoleum clean and d.y. If applied with a paint brush at night it should be perfectly dry by morning.

PEELING ONIONS
Dip an onion for a moment in boiling water and then begin at the root and peel upwards. It will be found that this method does not affect the tear ducts of the eyes.

SALT
To keep salt so it can be easily shaken, from the shaker, mix one teaspoon of cornstarch with each cup of salt. This will prove effective even during damp weather.

LINEN
When storing linen it will not turn yellow if wrapped in blue paper, or a piece of cloth that has been dipped in very strong bluing water. Or put blue enamel on the walls of the box or closet.

COOKING VEGETABLES
When it is desired to cook vegetables quickly, add a pinch of bicarbonate of soda to the boiling water and it will hasten the cooking.

OILCLOTH AND LINOLEUM
Oilcloth or linoleum should not be washed with hot soap suds. Wash with tepid water, then wipe with a cloth dampened in equal parts of cold milk and water.

About Your Home

Color can make or break the attractiveness of your home. It enhances a handsome home or enlivens a dull one.

The color scheme of the exterior of a house should be chosen with the largest visible area in mind. On a one and one-and-a-half story house this is usually the roof. On two and two-and-a-half story houses the walls will be the largest area for consideration.

The colors chosen for lesser features are of great importance because they give character to the house.

You have often heard that the roof of a house should be darker than the walls. This is not necessarily true. It depends entirely on the effect you want to create. For example — a light-colored one-story house will look higher if the roof is light. A dark roof tends to cut the house in half horizontally. A dark roof and dark walls on a one-story house gives the effect of a small cottage.

Proper color planning can improve the architectural appearance of a house. A bad feature of a house can be minimized by painting it the same color as the surrounding color with no contrast to call attention to it. By the same rule you can point up good features by contrasting them with their surroundings.
