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SHADE TREES. I have a nice stock of Shade and Ornamental Trees, Evergreens, &c., and now is the time to send in your orders for Shade Trees, while the blistering sun vividly reminds you that you need them. When cool weather comes, and with the press of business, you are likely to neglect them until it is too late in the spring to set them out. But send in your orders at any time, as it will be my business to see that you get them at the proper time. I can furnish experienced hands to set them, and when you once pay me for a shade tree you are sure to get it, as I replace all trees that die.
Those having tenement houses should plant shade trees, not only for the sake of humanity, but as an investment, for five or ten dollars spent for shade will, in a few years, increase the value of a lot from \$100 to \$500. Besides, trees are an excellent protection in case of fire, by breaking the heat and arresting the sparks.
