FROM THE DOMINION.

MONTECAL, August 23.—Two men named Lefevre and Lafleur accompanied by three ladies and four children were crossing the river near Boucherville yesterday when their boat upset. The men swam ashore but the women and children drowned. Six bodies of the victims have been recovered.

NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C., Aug. 23.—The Japanese Daily Mail of the 6th instant which was brought by the steamer Parthia says: A severe shock of earthquake was felt at Nagasaki July 22, at 8 40 p. m. The shock lasted five seconds. Great damage was done to porcelain shops and dwellings and several persons were injured. Another shock was felt on July 11.

ST. PETERSBURG, August 23.—The winter and summer wheat crops are reported as being generally favorable throughout Russia.

SUNDAY BALL PLAYING

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., August 22.—The Sunday baseball question is to be settled to-morrow morning by Judge Green of the criminal court. This morning warrants were sworn out for the arrest of the Birmingham and New Orleans players who took part in yesterday's game. The visiting players went home last night and the warrants were not served on them. The local players were arrested and to-morrow morning a writ of habeas corpus will be charged before Judge Green. It is the opinion of many prominent attorneys that there is no law authorizing the arrest of ball players, and Judge Green's decision will settle that point. Able counsel has been retained by both sides and the matter will be hotly contested.

REDUCTION OF THE PUBLIC DEBT.

—The amount of public debt paid off by this generation, in addition to the pensions and other like results of the civil war, is something astonishing. On August 31, 1865, the debt was \$2,755,965,575, with an annual interest charge of \$151,832,051. On August 9 of the present year the principal of the debt was \$1,165,424,650, a reduction in twenty-two years of \$1,590,540,925. In the same period the annual interest charge has been reduced to \$40,545,000, a decrease of \$111,287,051. Since the beginning of the present administration the principal of the debt has been diminished by \$240,488,700 and the interest charge by \$6,368,949. All this is a fine showing for the next generation, but it was hard upon this generation to tax it so heavily to pay off creditors who were not in a hurry for their money. Those who have been paying suffered many losses from the civil war, and it would have been better to let future generations have a chance to pay something for the blessings we transmit.—Baltimore Sun.
