THE ANARCHISTS.

New York, September 21.—Captain Black, counsel for the condemned anarchists, was expected in the city today to confer with General Roger A. Pryor, who, it is believed, will be retained in the case. General Pryor said this morning that Captain Black found it impossible to come to-day, but would certainly arrive Friday. Mr. Pryor would not say whether he had been employed as permanent counsel or not.

AN INCREASE OF TAX.

WASHINGTON, D. C., September 21.—Commissioner Miller of the internal revenue bureau, treasury department has prepared a statement which shows that the tax paid on spirits for the first two months of the present fiscal year was \$10,271,212, an increase of \$19,865.60 over the corresponding months of the last fiscal year.

Tobacco tax, \$5,579,138; increase \$941,818; fermented liquors, \$4,812,692; increase \$400,396; oleo-margarine \$838.86; miscellaneous \$280,040, decrease \$174.75. The total receipts are \$20,950,090 or an increase of \$1,607,279.

A CHAPTER OF ACCIDENTS.

MARQUETTE, MICH., Sept. 20.—A Duluth, South Shore and Atlantic train of six cars laden with ore got away from the trainmen last night and ran down grade at a high rate for four miles. At the same crash just west of the city the cars crashed into a side track full of empty ore flats. Fifty cars are piled 30 feet high. Billy Mahone, the conductor, is missing and there is no doubt that he is under the wreck. About the same time Robert Gurney, brakeman of the pier train, got caught between two cars and was scalped. He may live. At the same time the fire bell rang an alarm and it was found that the company's freight depot in the city was in flames. The fire was put out with very small loss.

THE SOCIALISTS CONGRESS.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Sept. 21.—The first business before the Socialists Congress this morning, was the report of the platform committee, and it will likely occupy the entire day. The committee offered a resolution in amendment to the following paragraph in the old platform: "That the land, the instruments of production, (machines, factories, etc.,) and all the productions of labor become the common property of the whole people." This is modified so that all but the products are common property. The resolutions also favor the substitution of a co-operative society in place of the present economic system by proper legislation, in order to prevent a conflict between the wealthy and the poor. The following was also added to the demands of the platform: "We demand assistance in the condition of workingmen, co-operative associations by governmental credit and preference of such associations in awarding of contracts by the national State and municipal governments."
