Already Framed.

Seeing in one of our exchanges the statement that a gentleman in one of our towns had had a cottage framed here and shipped to a distant point for the use of his family, has suggested the idea that some of our contractors might do some work on a problem in that same line: that is to say get up some plans for small, neat and convenient cottages, at small cost and let it be known that such things could be had here at a certain price.

At such a center as Greensboro, where material and machinery are abundant, and the workmen skillful, such a plan ought to succeed, and especially because there is a tendency in certain quarters to spend the hot part of the summer at attractive points here and there on the railroads. This tendency can easily be stimulated and portable houses be kept on hand for sale or rent. These houses could be made for use without floors, where desired, also without roofs, to be covered with canvass to suit the taste of the occupants.

Communities of our citizens could in that way move out to places of resort near the railroad lines and make very pleasant temporary homes at a cost far less than the charges at hotels and boarding houses. A select company association would be an excellent idea, and the places of encampment need not exceed thirty to forty miles from Greensboro, at points where the purest and best of table supplies could be had at reasonable rates.
