JUDGE SCHENCK'S HISTORICAL ADDRESS.—We observe with pleasure the apparently universal acceptance and commendation of the most scholarly editors and public men of the State of the Historical Address of Hon David Schenck, delivered by him on the Battle Ground of Guilford Court House on the fifth day of May, on the occasion of the anniversary celebration.

Among the prominent individuals who have thus expressed themselves, is Judge A. S. Merrimon of the Supreme Court Bench of North Carolina. Judge Merrimon is very decided and emphatic in his appreciation of the valuable labor performed in producing the admirable address. We quote him in part only: "I thank you heartily for a copy of your Historical Address. I have read it with interest, pleasure, and much satisfaction. The conclusions you reach must be gratifying to every true North Carolinian, as well as to every friend of truth and justice. You have done a noble service in vindicating the truth of history and correcting misstatements of historical facts that tarnish the memory of a body of patriotic men. Your earnest words, as I read them, stirred the depths of my nature, and I felt a fervor of gratitude to our heroes of that battle, including the militia, that no language can express. We owe it to them, to ourselves and to truth to do them justice on the pages of history and in the light of posterity. God bless you for what you have done in this behalf."

An editorial in the Wilmington Morning Star of a few days ago gave an extended and highly appreciative and complimentary notice of the Address, which we proposed to draw upon at length, but by an oversight the paper has been destroyed and we are denied the privilege which said editorial would have afforded us.

Judge Schenck's able management of his subject, preceded by his painstaking and persevering investigations and collations of documents, has already brought out expressions of concurring appreciation and endorsements from the highest literary and critical authorities of our own State, and will reach out in due time far beyond its limits. The subject is one of no little historic interest, and is destined to call forth the highest criticism from far and near.
