The county commissioners have been in session to-day, and their doings will be noted hereafter.

When last heard from Mr. J. W. Scott and his company were on board the steamer Manteo, on the Albemarle and Chesapeake canal, heading for Norfolk, and expected to land in New York last evening.

Trip to Virginia.

MR. EDITOR:—I give you an account of my trip to the Virginia State Fire Department as a representative of the Greensboro Fire Department. I left home on Tuesday night, arriving at Lynchburg at 3 o'clock, a. m. Having several hours to wait for the train to Roanoke I went through No. 4 Fire Station and was shown the workings of improved methods. They have three men and one horse and one reel in use. The men are paid by the city and required to stay there all the time, excepting one half day per week to spend with their families. They tell me they have been raised from sleep by the telegraph alarm and been on the way to fire in from six to ten seconds, having thrown water two squares away from quarters in three minutes.

Leaving for Roanoke I found the road in splendid condition, and good time was made. Crops for 30 miles looking rather light; the balance of the way crops good. We arrived at Roanoke at 9:30, a. m., just in time to take part in the grand procession, which was composed of eight or nine fire companies and representatives from others. The city was full of people and the streets beautifully decorated. After the procession was over we repaired to the Skating Rink where everything that one could wish in the way of edibles and lemonade to drink was set before us. At three o'clock the Association met in the Opera House where addresses of welcome were delivered and committees on credentials were appointed, also the presentation of a beautiful ice pitcher to the President, whose name I have forgotten. Next day the Convention met and discussed a great many topics of interest and value to firemen. At night there was a torch light procession and fire works. Next day the Norfolk and Western Railroad Co. gave a free excursion to the Pocahontas mine. Having to leave for home at an early hour I missed that part of the programme. With some time to wait again in Lynchburg on my way home I went again to its fire department—No. 2, main station, where I met with the same readiness to give any information wanted. Here they keep eight or ten men, seven horses, two steamers, one hook and ladder truck and two extinguishers. They make and mend almost everything that is needed in the department. Here the telegraph alarm showed its efficiency, the men getting the alarm the moment the fire is discovered. Trusting I have not trespassed too far already, I will close.
