The taking of the eleventh census, which has just been ordered by Congress to occur in 1890, will be a great deal smaller than that of 1880. The census publications will be confined to the following subjects: Population and social statistics relating thereto; the productions of manufacture, mining and agriculture, mortality and vital statistics; valuation and public indebtedness. Bradstreet, in referring to this subject says: "The plan thus arrived at may be regarded as on the whole a wise and proper one. Robinson, and "Clusters of Gems," by Dr. Pierson, are both excellent. The sermons, of which there are eight, are by such eminent preachers as Drs. Denis Wortman, Chas. Cuthbert Hall, R. S. Storrs, Bishop Andrews, J. C. Allen and others. The first named is one of the most strikingly beautiful and instructive sermons we have read in many a day. The Miscellaneous Section contains several papers of unusual value. All the other departments are crowded with fresh and interesting matter. Certainly the make-up and execution of the whole number give no hint that the dog-star is in the ascendant.
