News Items Wanted.

The Daily Register has news of the death of Capt. W. J. Merritt, at Jacksonville, Fla. He was formerly a citizen of Danville. His death was caused by inhaling sulphur in the fumigation of mails, producing a hemorrhage of the lungs.

Yellow Fever.

There are 242 persons ill with fever at Jacksonville. In 24 hours up to noon yesterday there had been four deaths. The plan to depopulate the city is not thought practicable, and the disease will probably take its course. The cities of Gainesville, Palatka, and Orlando, are reported healthy, with Fernandina in good sanitary condition on the 1st of September.

Inquiry having been made by Dr. Mitchell, of Jacksonville, Fla., whether refugees from the fever districts would be allowed to enter western N. C., without quarantine, Gov. Scales and his council have answered that they have no authority to act, such authority being vested in the county and town boards. Murphy and Hendersonville have offered to receive refugees, and they are already arriving.

Rev. S. M. Smith, D. D., of Washington, N. C., will preach at the Centenary M. E. church to-morrow at a quarter before 5 p. m., this church having been kindly tendered to the Westminster Presbyterian congregation for this service, and it is hoped that the congregation will all attend, and bring their pastor's salary and invalid fund envelopes and a liberal contribution for the contingent fund.

The Graded Schools.

The Greensboro Graded Schools will open next Monday (10th). In order to make the classification and grading of pupils, both old and new, as thorough as practicable, on Monday, from 9 to 12 o'clock, will be received only those pupils who range in age from 6 to 9 years inclusive, and such others as may attain to school age (6 yrs) prior to January 1st.

On Tuesday will be received only those between the ages of 10 and 13 years inclusive. On Wednesday and Thursday no exercises will be held. On Friday will be received those only between the ages of 14 and 18 years, inclusive, and such others as are over 18 years, (limit of school age) and may enter on payment of the prescribed tuition fees.

On Monday, 17th, all pupils will return and enter upon the regular work of the session. The rates of tuition for non residents, and those who are over 18 years of age, are as follows:

Primary Grades, (1, 2, 3 & 4) \$1 per month
Intermediate " (5 and 6) \$1.25 " "
Upper " (7, 8, 9 and 10) \$1.50 " "
Classical " \$2.00 " "

It is very important that all pupils who purpose entering school should do so promptly at the beginning of the session in order that they shall lose none of the advantage of beginning with their proper classes. The teachers are requested to meet at the school building Monday, at 8:15 a. m. J. L. TOMLINSON, Supt.

A Timely Topic.

Under the above head the Wilmington Star says:

The unfortunate condition of affairs in Florida will, it is thought, result in a diversion of much of the winter travel heretofore going to that State, to points in North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia.

We are not sure of this. It does not follow that where yellow fever occurs in any one season it returns again to the same place soon after. The disease greatly afflicted Norfolk and Wilmington some years ago—Norfolk in 1855, and Wilmington in 1862—but these places have been exempt since then. It may be, and we trust will be, that by the adoption of timely and effective hygienic measures, Jacksonville and other places of usual resort in Florida may hereafter prove as safe as they were previous to this present severe visitation of yellow fever.

Meeting of City Commissioners.

FRIDAY NIGHT, SEPTEMBER 6.

The Board of Commissioners met last night at the usual hour, Mayor Barringer in the chair, and notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather the following members were in attendance: Schenck, Odell, Turner, Scott, Dodson, Bevell, Ellington, Hawkins, Nelson, Coffin, White.

The minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

On motion the sum of five dollars was ordered to be paid Rev. Mr. Ball for work done on Spring street.

Mr. Odell presented a paper with a diagram of the grade of South Elm street, which was adopted.

Commissioner Dodson offered the two following resolutions, which were adopted:

RESOLVED, That an engineer be employed by the city to supervise the work of grading and paving South Elm street, and that the Committee be directed to ascertain at what price an engineer can be hired, and report as early as possible to the Board.

RESOLVED, That the question of taking out trees be left to the judgment of the engineer, and when the tree will naturally prevent the laying down of the pavement or curb stone, according to contract between the city and contractor, that he direct the tree to be removed and his judgment shall be final.

On motion, the bids for building the engine house were opened, and the matter fully discussed, but in order to come to a fuller and more satisfactory understanding of the whole matter, the Board was called to meet in the counting rooms of the Odell Hardware Company on Monday next, at 5 o'clock, p. m. Messrs Julius A. Gray, President of the C. F. & Y. V. Railroad, and of the Greensboro Chamber of Commerce, and Col. R. M. Douglas of the Chamber of Commerce, were present in the meeting and made remarks in relation to the building of a more capacious and convenient railroad depot at this place. There was a general interchange of views on this important matter, Judge Schenck expressing himself in his capacity of Commissioner, but without the purpose of proposing any definite action at this time. On motion, adjourned.

Electricity From the Wind.

The power of a wind-mill has been successfully applied to the generation of electricity for domestic purposes by Prof. Blyth, of the Glasgow Philosophical Society. The wind-mill was of the old-fashioned kind, with four arms each thirteen feet long. The dynamo was belted directly to the fly-wheel of the mill, and charged twelve coils of storage-battery. The current was used both for light and for driving a turning-lathe. Ten 8 candle power incandescent lamps were supplied, with current to spare; and a good breeze for half a day stored electricity enough for the light required on four evenings of three or four hours each.

Burning the Dead.

Cremation was proposed in Italy in 1866, experimented upon in 1872, illustrated at Vienna in 1873, and advocated by Sir Henry Thompson as a desirable substitute for burial in 1874. One cremation at Breslan and one at Dresden took place in 1874, and two at Milan in 1876. It was shown in 1879 that the human body can be entirely consumed, without smoke or effluvia, in about an hour. In the ten years ending with 1886 there were 461 cremations at Milan; and at Gotha 473 bodies were burned between January 1, 1879, and October 31, 1887. There are now crematoriums in Denmark, Belgium, Switzerland, Holland, Sweden, Norway, France, England, and various parts of the United States. Cremation is especially recommended where death has occurred from small-pox, scarlet fever, or diphtheria.
