The Baptist State Convention.

This large body of Christian ministers and laymen will assemble in Greensboro on Wednesday, November 14th. The committee of arrangements have begun the work of providing homes for these visitors, and it is to be presumed that the hospitalities of this city will be broad enough to make pleasant and welcome homes for all. To effect this in a creditable manner it will be necessary that the families of the city be ready to respond liberally to the committee of arrangements, which we feel assured they will do. The Convention will begin its session on Wednesday and finish up on Saturday.

The new cottage for the Cemetery keeper occupies one of the finest building sites in the city. Standing on an eminence facing Edgeworth street, it affords a magnificent view of the college, and from it can be seen the turrets of nearly all the principal buildings, including the McAdoo House and the water tower, with the county court house.
