Douglas Settle arrived here from West Point, N. Y., last night in response to a telegram announcing the death of his father, Judge Settle.

There is hardly any sickness in our city at this time. In fact, we think the season has been remarkably favorable to health.

Work on the various buildings now going up in the city is being pushed forward under the impression that the favorable season may close at any time.

NEWSPAPER CONSOLIDATION—The North Carolina Prohibitionist, the Prohibition Leader, and the Progress have been consolidated under the name of the North Carolina Prohibitionist, which is located in Durham, under the management of Mr. W. G. Burkhead as editor.

Mr. George R. Blackwell, of Durham, is announced by the Tobacco Plant as having assigned to Jas. S. Manning, with W. T. Blackwell, Mr. J. L. Blackwell, and Smith, Blackwell & Co., preferred creditors. Liabilities about \$9,000.

The children of the West Market street church Missionary Society held very interesting services last night in the auditorium of the church under the direction of Mrs. Lucy Robertson. The attendance was good, the music fine, and the elocutionary performances, in some instances capital, and in all instances highly creditable.

The stockholders of the Savings and Deposit Bank of North Carolina met in their banking house in this city on Saturday Dec. 1, 1888, and elected the following board of 9 Directors: D. F. Caldwell, L. M. Scott, W. R. Murray, J. W. Scott, T. C. Worth, Dr. W. A. Lash, Judge J. H. Dillard, Dr. Benbow and W. M. Houston, after which the stockholders meeting adjourned to meet Dec. 22. Directors met to-day and completed the organization by electing the following officers: D. F. Caldwell, President; W. R. Murray, Vice President; W. B. Bogart, cashier; W. D. Biggers, of Lexington, N. C., Book keeper, and L. M. Scott, attorney.

Funeral of the Late Judge Settle. The following is the programme for the funeral of the late Judge Thomas Settle, which will occur at 2 o'clock this p. m.

As the remains are borne into the church Prof. Sullivan, of Greensboro Female College, will play on the organ Chopin's Funeral March, following which "Rock of Ages" will be sung by Miss Hackleton, Miss Alice Jones, Mr. A. G. Robinson and Mr. C. H. Ireland.

After the address from the pulpit and the service for the dead by Rev. Egbert W. Smith are concluded, Miss Hackleton will sing "Oh! for the wings of a dove," from Mendelssohn's "Hear My Prayer," and as the cortege shall leave the church the quartette will sing "Asleep in Jesus." The procession will then take up the line of march to Greene Hill Cemetery, where the interment will occur.

On opening the United States court here this morning, Mr. Levi M. Scott announced the death of Hon. Thos. Settle and stated that the bar desired to hold a meeting, whereupon his Honor, Judge Dick, granted the request and tendered the use of the court room. On motion of judge John A. Gilmer, Mr. L. M. Scott was called to the chair and Mr. R. R. King requested to act as Secretary. A committee was appointed, consisting of Judge Dick, Judge Gilmer, Mr. Scott, Judge John H. Dillard and Col. J. E. Boyd, to draft suitable resolutions commemorative of the deceased. The bar decided to attend the funeral in a body, after which the meeting adjourned.

His Honor, Judge Dick, again took the bench, and on motion of Col. Jas. E. Boyd, the court adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock in respect to the memory of the deceased.
