Church to be Built.

The lot has been purchased as a site for the Methodist Protestant house of worship which that denomination propose to build in this city. The lot is situated on Lee street between the residences of Mr. W. S. Ball and Mr. B. C. Sharp, fronting North 68 feet with a depth of 165 feet. The situation is believed to be a most excellent one, and the immediate community second to none in the city. The deed for the property has been recorded and this important step completed in the work of building the contemplated church, which is designed to be of modern, neat, tasteful architecture, and worthy of its surroundings.

From almost time immemorial there has been a small nucleus of Methodist Protestants in this city, and at several different times the question of building an altar for public worship has come up for consideration, but never until recently has anything like a crystallization of the building sentiment been attained; and this change has been the outgrowth in large measure of the impression that Greensboro is on the highway to an enlarged population, and is consequently destined to receive in the near future a still larger influx of the Methodist Protestant element. Now at length, after years of inactivity as to providing a church home for its children, the Methodist Protestant denomination decides to rear a temple for the worship of Almighty God and to honor His Holy Name.

Happily the date of this movement finds the leading denominations of the city provided with neat and comfortable houses of worship, which fact would seem to make the season an opportune one in which to effectuate the enterprise now contemplated. Greensboro may justly claim to be a center of good schools, good morals and church privileges, and especially of religious toleration and fraternity, and the addition of this one more house of worship but adds ONE MORE DENOMINATION to those which have here already a habitation and a name. We are pleased to have a most favorable report of the agent of this new enterprise as to the outlook for complete success, his impression being highly encouraging and satisfactory. There is one view of this matter, however, which may look as if it were an appeal to secular motives—if so let it be. It is this: The building of a Methodist Protestant house of worship in this city must tend to attract people of that persuasion in other places to come and make their homes here. That this is a fact we are well assured, as such things often occur. So that we can say with a good deal of assurance, that the building of this church must add to the capital and the population of the city, and the more so since it is largely represented in the community from which our population is drawn.
