—A pitched battle between a number of negroes and a band of illicit distillers is reported from the mountains of Cherokee County, in which two white men and a negro were killed and six negroes were wounded, including two women.

—Our young friend John B. Farish returned last night from Raleigh, where he underwent examination before the North Carolina Board of Pharmacy, and was entirely successful, being approved by the Board, and is now fully licensed.

—There will be a meeting at Belle Vue Institute on to-morrow, (Friday) evening at 7:30 o'clock for the purpose of consultation in regard to the introduction of a bill in the Legislature allowing tax-payers in consolidated school district No. 4, to levy a special tax to raise a school fund for said district.
