John S. Clarkson has been appointed first assistant Post Master General.

Evangelist Pearson will, on Sunday night next, begin a series of meetings at Columbia, S. C.

We had a pleasant call yesterday from Mr. Coon, one of the proprietors of the Asheboro Courier, who was on a visit here.

The brig Agnes Barton was wrecked four miles below Virginia Beach last night, and six of her crew and the captain were drowned.

Rev. B. R. Hall, Presiding Elder of Mt. Airy Dist., will preach at West Market St. church to-night at 8 o'clock. Public cordially invited to attend.

The Commissioners of the city will meet to-night at 7:30 o'clock. All members of the board are requested to be present as there is business of importance.

There has been just enough of rain today to show our citizens how badly we need a pavement. What a relief will be experienced in the completion of that work.

THE CHORAL ASSOCIATION.—We are authorized to announce that, in consequence of the uncertainty and threatening aspect of the weather, there will be no meeting of the Choral Association this week, but that there will be such a meeting on Saturday evening, March 23, 1889, in the rooms of the W. C. T. U. A full meeting is earnestly requested.

About 4,000 of the Fall River, Mass., strikers held a mass meeting yesterday. The men were urged not to return until all could go in a body. The final result seems uncertain.

A fifty-four inch tubular boiler at the West Point Boiler Works, Pittsburg, Pa., exploded yesterday with terrible results. The building was totally wrecked, and a number of workmen killed and wounded.

Adams, the forger of Macon, Ga., after abstaining from food 27 days, died on the night of the 13th inst. He believed, it is said, that his fasting would atone for his errors, and in dying appeared repentant.

When we read of the many new industries being projected in our neighboring towns, we can not but regret that a few of them are not to have a home in Greensboro, which is so favorably situated for such things.

The rain to-day has been unfavorable for the attendance at the Battle Ground. However, we trust that there were enough present to set on foot the programme for the Pic Nic to occur on the 6th of May.

The coroner's jury in the case of the killing of Captain Dawson in Charleston on Tuesday last, rendered a verdict that the deceased came to his death at the hands of Dr. McDow, and that the killing was malicious. The colored office servant of Dr. McDow is held as accessory after the fact.

The following persons from the different churches have been appointed treasurers for the Pearson Meeting and to raise funds to pay expenses of same, W. E. Beville Genl. Treas., Jesse Abbott and E. P. Wharton of the Presbyterian churches, Col. Jas. Winsted and G. T. Glasscock of the Methodist and H. Wakefield the Baptist.

Dr. A. Y. Linville, of Belevs Creek, who has just graduated at the University of New York, reached here this morning, on his way home, and made us a pleasant call. We are glad to hear of his success. The Dr. spent some time in Washington, where he saw the new President and other dignitaries of the government, and was highly entertained. The Dr. went up to Belevs Creek on the 3 o'clock, p. m. train to day.
