Storage of Oil.—An Ordinance.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE
 Board of Commissioners of the
 City of Greensboro

1. That it shall be unlawful for any
 person, firm or corporation to keep or
 store more than five barrels in quantity
 of kerosene or other oils for illumination
 within that part of the corporation
 where wooden buildings are forbidden
 to be erected and commonly known as
 the "fire limits" in the city.

2. That it shall be unlawful for any
 person, firm or corporation to keep or
 store more than twenty-five barrels in
 quantity of kerosene or other oils for
 illumination within the limits of the city,
 unless the same shall be kept in a
 building constructed of brick or stone,
 with iron roof or arched roof, made of
 brick or stone, with no opening except
 doors in one side or end and these to
 be covered with or cased with iron, the
 floor of said building to be at least 8
 feet below the lowest surface of the
 ground immediately surrounding it, or
 in an iron oil tank such as are used for
 transportation of kerosene oil by the
 railroads.

3. That every person violating this or-
 dinance shall be fined fifty dollars or im-
 prisoned thirty days at the discretion of
 the court trying the case.

4. That this ordinance shall go into
 effect on the 10th day of March, 1889.

5. That this ordinance be published in
 the "Daily Workman" one week for
 the information of all persons concern-
 ed and that it be spread on the minutes
 of the Board.

 to show cause (a copy of which is at-
 tached to said affidavit) was duly issued
 by said Board of Commissioners to said

 iff of said county has returned said or-
 der endorsed: "After due diligence
 no officer or agent of The Georgia Com-
 pany upon whom the service of this or-
 der can be lawfully made, can be found
 in my county;" that after due diligence
 no officer or agent of The Georgia
 Company upon whom the service of
 said order can be lawfully made, can
 be found within the State.

It is therefore ordered that the ser-
 vice of said order to show cause upon
 said The Georgia Company be made by
 publishing the same once a week for
 four weeks in The Daily Workman, a
 newspaper published in Greensboro,
 Guilford County, North Carolina.
