IMPORTANT ACTION IN THE U. S. COURT.—The suit against Col. R. M. Douglas, recently decided in his favor in the U. S. Circuit Court here, was brought by the United States upon his official bond for damages resulting from the alleged loss of four thousand gallons of whiskey in 1880, from the distillery warehouse of W. H. Winstead in Person county.

It was admitted that marshal Douglas personally was in no way to blame; but the Government contended that the loss occurred through the negligence of his Deputy, for whose acts and omissions the Marshal's bond was responsible. This was denied by the defendants, and the verdict of the jury sustained them.

Indeed, so clearly were the facts in favor of Col. Douglas that he introduced no witnesses whatever, although he had several in attendance; and the case was decided in his favor solely on the testimony offered by the Government.

Meeting of City Commissioners

MONDAY NIGHT, APRIL 12.

The Board met in regular session Friday night, April 12th, 1889. Mayor Barringer presiding and the following members present: Odell, Beville, Scott, Ellington, Dodson, Nelson, White.

ON MOTION, it was ordered that North Elm street be made to conform in width to South Elm street, which will necessitate the widening of the side walks of North Elm street.

The question of the boundaries of the Colored Graded School lot was referred to the School Committee.

ON MOTION the following persons were duly appointed poll holders for the ensuing municipal election, to be held on first Monday in May, 1889: 1st Ward—Geo. Donnell, 2nd ward, W. S. Rankin, 3rd ward, J. D. Donnell, 4th T. B. Balseley.

J. R. Pearce was duly appointed Registrar for the City.

ON MOTION, the Mayor to have the standing Committees under the Board of Commissioners make report of all the improvements made in the city for the past two years.

RESOLVED, That the petition of citizens about well on South Elm street be referred to the Street Committee to ascertain what will be the cost, &c., of putting in pump in said well, and report at next meeting.

ON MOTION, the sum of not exceeding fifty dollars was appropriated to furnish the Firemen's hall, to be expended under the direction of the Engine house Committee.

The city treasurer reported the receipt of two hundred and fifty dollars, this being one installment from the Peabody Fund for the support of the Graded Schools of the city.

After acting on several bills, on motion the meeting adjourned.

The Board met in special session last night, at 6:30 o'clock, to consider the question of a contract for lighting

the city. Mayor Barringer in the chair, and the following members present: Schenck, Nelson, Ellington, Dodson, Beville, White, Coffin. Mess. Chas. Vance and Hugh Peters, of the Greensboro Electric Light Company, were present, and made an offer for lighting the city with electricity, and the matter was thoroughly discussed.

The number of lights needed could not be ascertained with certainty, some thinking 30 would answer, while others mentioned 35, 40, and 45. The Company finally proposed to place the minimum number of lights at 35, cost of each light \$80 per annum and contract to run three years. After discussion and a vote the proposition was accepted, as expressed in the following resolution: RESOLVED.

That the Light Committee draw up a contract for not less than thirty-five (35) lights at \$80 each, to continue all night, contract to run three years, and submit to the Board for confirmation.

On motion the Board adjourned.
