**Wills.**

"When Jim Fiske was killed, his will gave all his property to his wife. His estate was inventoried at nearly three and a half millions. The moment the will was proved, barbers began to flock about the corpse in countless numbers. When the consequent litigation was added, the estate had vanished. The widow is now living on a small farm in New England, and is a very poor woman. The vast property was eaten up by lawyers, doctors, adventurers, and in short, by every one save the person to whom the Prince of Erie intended it should go. The present litigation over the Stewart estate is a good instance of the necessity for some change in laws affecting the distribution of estates. When Alexander T. Stewart died his wealth was valued at anywhere between twenty and forty millions of dollars. At the end of a dozen years his widow, to whom he left nearly all of it, was in debt to the executor in the sum of \$900,000, and the estate has shrunk to twelve millions. There was a bitter lawsuit, a compromise, and the latter sum is divided up among people to whom Stewart never spoke and to whom he would not have given nor loaned a single cent. There should be some reform in these matters, but it is a long way off. Any good bill would be opposed by the legal profession, as it would cut off a source of revenue that now brings in more than a million of dollars every year."—N. Y. Star.
