THE CITY FATHERS.

THEY MET LAST NIGHT AND TRANSACTED

Business of Much Importance to The City—Proceedings of The Meeting.

The city commissioners met last night, Mayor Forbis in the chair. The following were present:

Price, Dodson, King, Sergeant, J. W. Scott, Thomas, H. L. Scott, Houston, Mendenhall, Douglas, Love, Hodgin, Lewis and Beall.

The registrar and poll holders appointed to hold election on extension Monday, filed their returns with the Mayor, the Mayor submitted a report stating that the vote on extension had carried by a large majority, and the following resolution was proposed and adopted.

Be it resolved, by the Board of Aldermen of the city of Greensboro, That

Whereas, The returns from the recent election held on the extension of the city limits, just filed with the Board, show a large majority of the vote cast to be for extension, both from the city and from the proposed limits, now therefore, Be it

Resolved, That the city limits are extended as provided in act of General Assembly, ratified March 7th, 1891.

The new members of the Board, J. R. Mendenhall, R. M. Douglas, Wm. Love, J. A. Hodgin, John Lewis, W. P. Beall, came forward and the Mayor administered the oath of office.

Mr. J. A. Odell appeared before the Board and asked to be allowed to make addition to the frame warehouse in the rear of Odell Hardware Co's. property, extending it so as to front on Davie street.

Mr. H. B. Tatum asked to be allowed to make an extension to his livery stable in the rear of Balsley lot on South Elm street.

Mr. J. M. Dick appeared and asked to be allowed to build a frame building to cover his machinery in rear of steam laundry.

The Board refused to relax the ordinance requiring buildings erected within the fire limits to be constructed of metal or brick.

Mr. D. W. Carl appeared and filed statement by two members of the local Board of underwriters stating that the erection of a new blacksmith shop upon the site of the one now occupied by Mr. Carl, according to the plans proposed by him, would not increase the rate of insurance on the surrounding property.

Mr. Price moved that Mr. Carl be allowed to build the new shop, not to extend more than 12 inches beyond the foundations of the old one.

The Superintendent of the Graded Schools presented his report ending March 27th '91, and stated that both white and colored Graded Schools were full, some of the rooms being crowded; whereupon Mr. G. S. Sergeant chairman school committee introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, As it will be impossible to furnish at once school accommodation for all children of school age within the present enlarged borders of our city limits, it becomes necessary to declare our schools full—both white and colored, and to refuse admittance in either school until arrangements for more room and additional teachers be perfected.

Upon the adoption of this resolution the ayes and nays were called for and the vote resulted as follows: Ayes, Dodson, Sergeant, J. W. Scott, Thomas, H. L. Scott, Mendenhall, Love, Hodgin, Lewis, Beall and King. Nays, Price and Houston.

Mr. Houston moved that the chairman of the street committee be instructed to accept the offer of Mr. Armfield of the road machine and hire horses, to use the machine for levelling the streets. Carried.

Mr. C. D. Benbow chief of the fire department submitted his report for the year, setting forth the work of that department.

The resignation of Alderman King was indefinitely postponed.

Mr. King offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Mayor appoint five Aldermen as a special committee to purchase a crushing outfit and good, sufficient roller, also power is hereby given said committee to make contract for a supply of stone for crushing purposes; The expense of the outfit and contract to be paid out of the bond fund. Carried.

Messrs. King, Douglas, H. L. Scott Mendenhall and Price were appointed as that committee.

Mr. King moved that a committee of one from each ward be appointed to consider the laying off of the wards of the city and the representation therein and make a report to an adjourned meeting on Friday night next.

Mr. Douglas offered the following ordinance as a substitute for Mr. King's motion:

Be it ordained, That the wards of the city remain as now constituted, with the same representation, except that the 5th and 6th wards be divided by the center of Arlington street and its extension.

The ayes and nays were called for on the vote the substitute. The vote was as follows: Ayes, J. W. Scott, Mendenhall, Douglas, Love, Hodgin, Lewis, Beall, Nays, Price, Dodson, King, Sergeant, Thomas, H. L. Scott and Houston. There being a tie vote, the Mayor voted no.

Mr. King's motion was then carried. The following was the committee appointed: Beall, Love, Brown, Sergeant, Thomas and King.

Mr. Love moved that the registration heretofore taken for extension be operative for the coming municipal election and that advertisement for those who have not registered to come and register and that a new registration for those who have registered be not necessary. Carried.

The Mayor announced that Mr. Keogh had withdrawn his appeal for damages allowed for the opening of King and Pearson streets through his property and stated that he had issued a warrant to Mr. Keogh for one hundred dollars, the amount recommended by the committee, and exhibited and filed the receipt of Mr. Keogh for the same.

Mr. H. L. Scott moved that the street committee be instructed to pave the space between the C. F. & T. V. and the R. & D. R. R. tracks.

Mr. Sergeant moved as a substitute that the matter be referred to the street committee and they make a report of the same at the next meeting of the Board. Carried.

The Board appointed the following committee to make the annual settlement with the city treasurer and the city tax collector: King and Brown.

After approving the bills the Board adjourned.
