Runaway.

A runaway occurred late yesterday afternoon, which came near being a serious affair.

Mr. W. A. Fariss, Mrs. Fariss and their little son, and Miss Betts, sister of Mrs. Fariss, were coming back home from Mt. Airy's Chapel Camp Meeting in a one horse jersey. When they got near Mr. Fariss' Bakery, on South Elm Street, Sergeant Whittington stepped from the side walk and went into the street to tell Mr. Fariss that some one had broken into his store. He raised his hand as a signal to stop, when the horse made a sudden lurch and broke the single-tree. The horse began running up South Elm Street towards the Court House, when the right line broke. Mr. Fariss still held on to the left line, which pulled the horse to the left side of the street against the water-plug, throwing all of the occupants out of the jersey. Mrs. Fariss received a wound on her forehead and one on the back of her head; Mr. Fariss had his right knee badly skinned and cut; their little son had his left knee and arm badly bruised. Miss Betts was not hurt.

The wounded are getting along as well as could be expected.

The vehicle was badly damaged.

SUDDEN DEATH OF MR. J. F. MOORE.

A telegram was received here this morning announcing the death of Mr. J. F. Moore, of Mt. Airy, which occurred suddenly of heart disease at the World's Dispensary, at Buffalo, N. Y. There were no particulars.

He left Mount Airy about two weeks ago for Buffalo, N. Y., for treatment at the Dispensary. He had an operation performed about 10 days ago. It is thought that this was the immediate cause of his death. Mr. Moore was a prominent citizen of Mount Airy, was the senior member of the firm of J. F. & W. A. Moore. He was a member of the syndicate, which bought the C. F. & Y. V. Railroad and had it extended through his section of the State

All white children from 6 to 12 living in the new territory south of the N. C. R. R. will report to Belle Vue Institute tomorrow at 9 o'clock, to be examined and to get tickets of admission.

On Sunday Samuel Armstrong broke into Mr. Fariss Bakery and stole some things therefrom. He was seen late Sunday afternoon going up Clay St., but has not been seen since. The police are after him.

Waddell and wife, Mary Wright Waddell, of Asheville, to George A.
