POLICEMAN WHITTINGTON SUSPENDED FROM THE POLICE

Photo. An Investigation to be Had Next Monday.

Police Committee filed following report:

Pursuant to a call of the Chairman the Police Committee met on the 21st, at 8 a. m., and remained in session two and a half hours. The business of the meeting was the following communication from the Chief Police:

TO THE HON. POLICE COMMITTEE. GENTLEMEN:—I hereby prefer charges against M. A. Whittington, Sergeant of Police. The charges are that he does not do his duty as police officer; simply failing to do service, having done less than one-fourth the average work done by the other members of the force.

Mr. Hall's evidence of the charge was based on the following record of the policemen, as shown by his books:

From May 1893 till date, F. R. Hall satisfied 64 warrants, \$169.40; W. J. Weatherly satisfied 48 warrants, \$452.00; S. N. Ridge satisfied 63 warrants, \$163.57; D. Scott satisfied 63 warrants, \$133.74; W. A. Scott satisfied 29 warrants, \$119.00; M. A. Whittington satisfied 8 warrants, \$93.80.

Mr. Whittington in his defense stated that he thought he had done his duty. That he had never omitted doing his duty, when he had known of an ordinance being broken; that he was sick and off duty for four weeks.

Messrs. D. Scott, W. H. Scott and S. N. Ridge testified that Mr. Whittington seemed willing to do his duty.

Mr. Ridge testified that on one occasion Mr. Whittington remarked to him that he did not give a damn whether he ever got another warrant.

Upon all the evidence submitted the committee thought best to recommend the suspension of Mr. Whittington until a further investigation could be made by the board of Aldermen.

Mr. R. H. King and J. Morehead appeared before the board in behalf of Mr. Whittington.

Alderman Gleason moved that the further consideration of this matter be postponed till Monday night next, when an investigation shall be had.

Eight Negroes To Hang.

Chestertown, Md., October 27.—Joshua Trainard, Lewis Benson, Henry Hurr, Moses Brown, Frisby Comegys, Chas. Brooks, Fletcher Williams and Charles Emery, all colored, were found guilty of murder in the first degree. They have been on trial since Monday. They were charged with the murder of Dr. Hill, on the road from Wellington to Massys, on the night of Saturday, April 23rd. John Potts, the ninth person on trial for the murder was found not guilty.

KIRKPATRICK HAS GIVEN THE ALDERMEN PERMISSION

To Widen Asheboro Street.

Mr. S. Kirkpatrick appeared before the Board and presented a proposition to the Board that he would consent for the city of Greensboro to have the right of way over a certain portion of his premises on Asheboro Street, needed as a sidewalk, providing the city should obligate itself to all the shade trees now standing on the strip of land to remain unremoved unless by reason of decay, any of all of the trees should die.

Alderman Pritchett moved that the proposition be accepted.

OTHER CITY COUNCIL ITEMS

Alderman Gleason moved that the consideration of the extension of Walker Avenue be postponed till next Monday evening.

Prof C. D. McIver asked that the city place an electric light on the hill near the residence of Mr. Epps on Walker Avenue.

Alderman Price moved that the matter be referred to the Light Committee.

A petition was presented from citizens asking that the Coal Shute be declared a nuisance and that the Railroad Company be urged to remove the same outside the city limits.

Alderman Pritchett moved that the matter be referred to the Police Committee.

Mr. Jas. D. Hie, keeper of cemetery presented a bill against the city for work done in the new portion, \$15.

Alderman Love moved that the matter be referred for the Cemetery Committee for a report.

Prof G. A. Griensley, Superintendent Graded School filed his monthly report.

Alderman Beacham reported that the market house had been connected with the city sewer.

Alderman Pritchett introduced the following resolutions:

Solved that the office of Sergeant of Police be abolished.

Alderman moved that the consideration be postponed till next Monday night.

J. H. Mills, Chairman of the County Commissioners, asking that the city extend its sewerage system so as to enable the County authorities to connect the jail therewith.

Referred to the Sewer Committee.

Alderman Scott presented from Mr. J. A. Barker, that he be allowed to build a wooden kitchen in the rear of his premises on Gas on Street.
