Mr. Editor:

Will you permit me the space to
express myself in regard to the
proposed Haywood County Hospital?I must confess that when this mat-
ter first came to my attention, I was
not in sympathy with this movement,
though I realized it was a matter of
great importance to the people of the
county. But since making some in-
vestigations, and after reading the en-
dorsements by practically all the in-
dustrial enterprises, and most of our
financial institutions, representing
our largest taxpayers, I wish to ex-
press myself as being heartily in fa-
vor of the hospital movement, and
think it will be a great misfortune to
all the people of the county if we fail
to carry the pending election for
bonds.The great Duke Foundation Fund
is intended to help just such hospitals
as the one proposed for Haywood
County, and we cannot afford to miss
the opportunity of participating in
the distribution of this great fund.
As I understand it is the purpose of
those in charge of this fund to aid in
the construction of such hospitals, as
well as to give permanent aid in the
care of charity cases. Such aid will
relieve the taxpayers of the greatest
burden in the operation of a public
hospital and should render such a
hospital in this county self-support-
ing.I am particularly impressed by the
statement that Haywood County has
not had a young man in a medical
college in ten years, and that in a
very few years we will have no coun-
ty doctors. When his time arrives, it
seems to me that some kind of a hos-
pital will be a necessity. So why
not build now and stop the stream of
patients going to Asheville to hospi-
tals where it is claimed, in ten years
they will have out enough to build
three hospitals like the one proposed.

GIVE THE BOARD OF EDUCATION
A FAIR DEAL.Some unfavorable criticism has
been directed upon the County Board
of Education because they have
not seen fit to take the initiative in
borrowing money with which to pay
the teachers of Waynesville township.
There are many circumstances regard-
ing this matter, but the average per-
son overlooks. Suppose we take a
peek at some of them.In making out the May budget
there are three funds to be provided
for: (a) a salary fund, (b) an oper-
ating and equipment fund, and (c) a
fund for the retirement of all notes,
loans and bonds. It is the law that
these funds be kept separate and dis-
tinct. As a matter of fact the teach-
ers' salary fund in Waynesville town-
ship was used by the township com-
mittee, or the Board of Education, to
finish paying for the equipment of
the schools in Waynesville township, a
thing that might be done temporarily
with the understanding that the fund
from which taken be replenished when
needed. The fund was not returned
that teachers must be paid when their
salaries were due.It, therefore, became necessary to
replace this fund in some way. Bor-
rowing seemed the only way, and in
order for the County Board of Educa-
tion to borrow money it is necessary
to have in the budget, either of the
township or the county a sum suffi-
cient to pay the installments of the
sinking fund and interest as they fall
due. And, too, the County Board of
Education can borrow for a local tax
district only upon a petition from the
local committee. The committee of
Waynesville township did not submit
their petition until last Monday, and
the County Board of Education took
it under consideration the moment it
was filed.These facts just given are necessary
to enable one to see who has been de-
ficient in this matter. The mere idea offair play would require any open
minded person to seek the reason for
a failure to act before fastening
blame.All of us are interested in better
schools for every quarter of the coun-
ty. Why not, then, let us all get to-
gether and hold up the hands of the
County Board of Education in their
arduous task in solving some of the
problems that confront them in this
