Mrs. Duncan Herren and children of Washington arrived Sunday and will visit her parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. V. Phillips until the first of September.

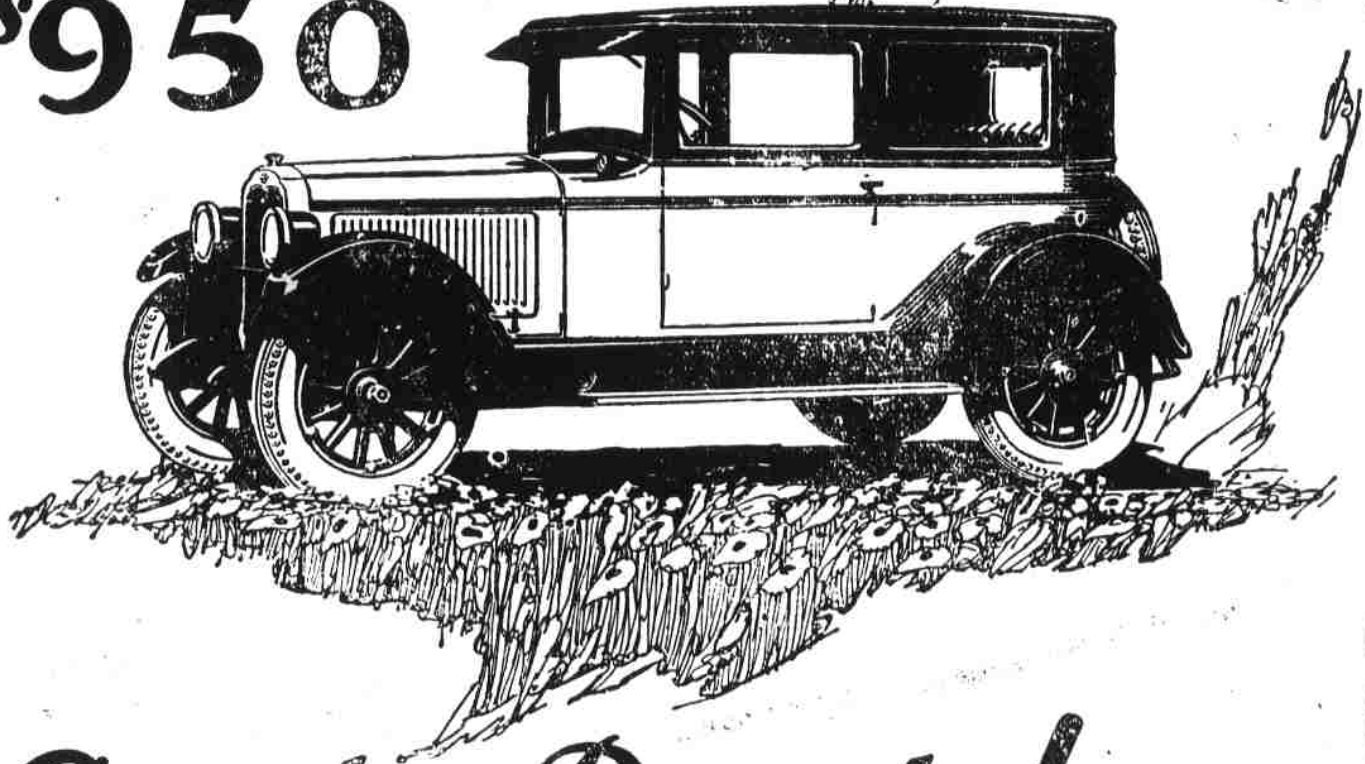
Miss Josephine Sennett of Hendersonville was the guest of Mrs. W. T. Lee over the week-end.
