THE article in last weeks usue of THE NEWS, which told of the robbery of this office, has been the means of many kind expressions from newspapers in this state and South Carolina, for which we are truly grateful.

The Charlotte Observer, under the heading, "A New Freak in Lurglary," says:

"The Polk County News came out this week with its face fairly covered with wrong fonts. The paper was issued under considerstile difficulties, due to a raid on a print shop by robbers in search of "pi." The raid itself is something extraordinary in the history of burglary. - "'The News office," says the editor, "was broken into last Saturday night or Sunday morning, and one cap case, well filed with capital letters, composing sticks and a quantity of newspaper body type taken out. The miscreants exidently entered by a window in the front of the office which could easily be opened. safe. The parties who raided The news office, however, did not know enough to accomplish their design, if it was to prevent the publication of the paper, for they left "'sorts' which were sufficient to make out with. "We will state that even if all the type and other material in the office had been stolen or wrecked The News would still be printed, as we are sure our newspaper friend, The Hustler, of Hendersonville, would gladly extend us the use of its equipment until our own establishment should be in running shape again. So that it would not be an easy task to put The News out of business without the consent of its publishers."

"Not only The Hustler, but every other newspaper in reach would have extended aid. There may be some ways of putting a newspaper out of business, but stealing its type is not one of them."

"Some miscreant robbed The Polk County News printing office of a "cap" case last week. This should come under the head of a capital offense, as the evident intent was to put The News out of business. It was a small piece of business at best, but we are glad to note that our friends survived the assault and came forth with an unusually bright number."


