Mr. Editor:-
Will you allow me space in your columns to call the attention of school Committeemen and teachers to an order passed by the former Board of Education fixing the date for opening the schools of Polk county on 1st. Monday in November, this order is continued by the present Board. I wish to call the attention of all Committeemen and teachers to section 4161 of school law, especially to that part of said section which relates to the employment of teachers- A careful reading of this section and a strict observance of same will save a great deal of annoyance to all concerned.

Teachers must be employed in strict accordance with the requirements of the law. No teacher should be employed until due notice of a regularly called meeting has been given at three public places by the Committee. Committees and teachers will notice that the County Supt. is prohibited from signing any voucher for teachers salary until he shall have received satisfactory evidence that such teacher has been elected in strict accordance with this section.
I wish to emphasize the following:
Don't employ a teacher except at a meeting called for the purpose after due notice.
Don't open the schools until 1st. Monday in November.
Don't contract to pay larger salary than fixed by the Board of Education for your school.
A copy of the school law has been mailed to the Committee in each school district and it is hoped that they will familiarize themselves with their duties as explained by the State Supt. in his notes.

What An Egg Is.
The average weight of a hen's egg is two ounces, containing nearly 200 grains of solids, divided as follows: Ten parts shell, sixty parts white, thirty parts yolk. White of egg consists of about 14 per cent. egg albumen and 86 per cent. water. There is some fat in it; also salt chiefly chlorides. Egg albumen and the temperature of 100 degrees F. The yolk consists principally of fat coloring matter and water; 52 per cent is water. It contains also grape sugar and salts, chiefly phosphates and iron compounds. --Exchange.
