Rutherfordton, N. C. May 4. Rutherford Democracy met in the convention today and elected delegates to the state congressional and senatorial conventions. The convention was largely attended by representative democrats from all parts of the county and was enthusiastic and harmonious throughout. Rutherford's delegation was instructed to cast her 12 votes in the state convention for Hon. Locke Craig for Governor, Hon. W. T. Crawford, was unanimously endorsed for congress as was also Mr. John C. Mills for state senate.

The Commencement exercises of the Spartan High School closed Tuesday night with a play entitled "Emergency," by the students and members of the faculty. The play was very good considering that it was rendered by amateur performers, and drew a large number of people from the surrounding country. It was also attended by people from Tryon, Lynn and Columbus.
