EXAMINATION FOR HIGH SCHOOL CERTIFICATE

An examination for the High School Teacher's Certificate will be held on September 11th and 12th at the county seat of each county of the State whose superintendent shall notify the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, by September 1st: of the number and names of applicants who desire to take the examination in ample time time to have their names reported to this office, in accordance with the foregoing. Questions will not be sent to any counties except those that give notice in accordance with these direction.

This will be the last examination of the year for this certificate. It is given to avoid requests for emergency certificates after some of the public high schools have opened with teachers that do not hold the proper certificate. County superintendents will take notice and should notify public high school committees that after the date of this examination no high school certificates will be issued to applicants requirizing examination until the next regular examination, the authoring the employment of teachers who do not hold High School Teacher's Certificates issued under the regular rules of the State Board of Examiners can be granted.

Applications should be made directly to the office of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, and notice of the same given to county superintendents, as indicated above.

All public high school teacher who begin their work without the High School Teachers Certificate will do so with the understanding that they cannot receive pay for the time taught with out the certificate in case they fail in this examination.
