If one objects to the odor of carboffs y use for the plumbing an edoriess disinfectant prepared as follows: Dissolve half a pound of permanganate of potash in four gallons of water and pour this carefully down the pipes. This solution, if allowed to stand in bowis or basins, will stain them purple. The stains may be removed with a weak solution of oxalic reid. The acid must be rinsed off immediately after it has been used
