DR. FREDERICK A. COOK'S JOYOUS WELCOME HOME

Brooklyn Greets Arctic Traveler With Pride and Affection.

"I HAVE COME FROM THE POLE"

After Two Years' Absence the Explorer is Greeted at His Home With Unprecedented Enthusiasm and Splendid Confidence.

Brooklyn, N. Y.—Amid shrieking whistles and tumultuous cheers, Dr. Frederick A. Cook returned home on the Oscar II. from his two years' absence in the arctic. From the moment the explorer in the morning stepped from the steamer to the small tug in which his wife had gone down the bay to meet him until long after midnight Dr. Cook was hailed by his admirers as the discoverer of the North Pole, and a homecoming welcome was accorded to him the sincerity of which could not be doubted.

In interviews, brief as they were, which Dr. Cook gave in the day he declared he had brought back with him ample proofs that he was the discoverer of the North Pole. These proofs he was asked to produce, but he said he would send them to the University of Denmark, at Copenhagen, where the Danish scientists would make them public.

Already, Dr. Cook declared, his story of his dash to the pole had been approved by Daegaard-Jensen, Inspector of Danish North Greenland. The Governor of Upernivik has assured the Danish Government of his conviction that Dr. Cook had reached the pole. It was upon this endorsement, Dr. Cook said, that the Danish people accepted his story.

Dr. Cook was silent as to the challenge to his assertion made by Commander Peary. He declared that he would not answer Commander Peary's criticisms until Peary had come to New York City, when, the explorer said, he would be willing to confront the Commander. Reminded that Commander Peary had insisted that Dr. Cook had "never been at the North Pole or anywhere near it," and that he "had Cook nailed," Dr. Cook merely replied:

"When Mr. Peary comes to town I will answer him; not before."

The Oscar II. lifted her anchor off Fire Island just after sunrise and slowly started to quarantine, reaching New York before 7 o'clock. About the time the Oscar II. was starting for quarantine the tug John C. Gilkinson, with Mrs. Cook, the explorer's wife, their two children, the explorer's two brothers, and Dr. Roswell Stebbins, chairman of the Reception Committee of the Arctic Club of America, left the Battery. The tug arrived at quarantine just as the steamer loomed out of the gray fog.

There was a blast from the siren of the Oscar II. and a shriek from the tug's whistle. Mrs. Cook, standing on the deck of the smaller craft with her children, raised her hand to her eyes and peered over toward the dimly outlined Oscar II. for a glimpse of her husband. There were probably a thousand passengers at the steamer's rail, all watching to see Mrs. Cook. Dancing around the Oscar II. were half a dozen tugs carrying reporters. A revenue cutter was slowly drawing up alongside the steamer.

Dr. Cook, on the steamer's deck, espied the John C. Gilkinson. He lifted his derby hat and waved it. His wife responded with a wave of her handkerchief. It took only a few minutes for the tug to reach the side of the steamer and for the gangway steps to be lowered to it. Dr. Cook stood at the gangway eager to board the tug. As he stepped down he was met by his youngest daughter, Ruth, who flung herself into his arms. Then his wife caught him in her embrace. The explorer made ready to transfer to the steamer, but before he could do so Miss Ida Lehmann, daughter of the treasurer of the Arctic Club, jumped to the tug's deck and out a wreath of roses about Dr. Cook's neck.

Dr. Cook indicated his thanks. Then, with the huge wreath in danger of being torn away, he went down the gangplank into the arms of a frantically cheering throng. "This is almost as bad as fighting your way to the pole," he gasped, his face wearing a broad smile. "Oh! you, Uncle Fred!" cried a feminine voice, and Miss Lillian Cook, the explorer's niece, edged her way through the crowd. Dr. Cook struggled against the crush until he had made a path for her. She kissed him and the crowd cheered again. Then while he was hemmed in at the gangway to the Grand Republic he turned to a member of the committee and asked him to give out a statement prepared for the newspaper men. With that he took some fifty typewritten copies from his pocket and handed them over. Here is the statement:

"On Board the Oscar II.—After one of the most delightful trips of my life across the Atlantic, I am indeed glad once more to see the shores of my native land. I have come from the pole. I have brought my story and my data with me. The public has already a tangible and a specific record of that trip. In a very short time the narrative, with all the observations, will be published and placed before the world for examination.

"It is as easy for you as for me to understand why I cannot, on the impulse of the moment, read off a manuscript which covers the work of two years. As said upon several occasions, all the charges, accusations and expressions of disbelief are based upon entire ignorance of the supplementary data which I possess. No one who has spoken or written on the subject in opposition to my claim knows of the facts with which my work of exploration is measured. All of the criticisms have been based upon obvious errors in the reproductions of my first dispatch, or upon the discussions of petty side issues presented by unfair critics.

"The expedition was private. It was started out without the usual public bombast. Mr. John R. Bradley furnished the money and I shaped the destiny of the venture. For the time being it concerned us only, but the results were so important, that on returning I at once placed before the public a report containing the main outline of the work. I have not come home to enter into arguments with one man or with fifty men, but I am here to present a clear record of a piece of work over which I have a right to display a certain amount of pride. When scientists study the detailed observations and the narrative in its consecutive order, I am certain that in the due course of events all will be compelled to admit the truth of my statement.

"I am perfectly willing to abide by the final verdict of this record by competent judges. That must be the last word in the discussion, and that alone can satisfy me and the public.

"Furthermore, not only will my report be before you in black and white, but I will also bring to America human witnesses to prove that I have been to the pole.

"FREDERICK A. COOK."

Sydney Welcomes Peary. Sydney, N. S.—The Roosevelt, flying from her raft a big American flag, crossed by a broad white band, upon which in letters of black appeared the words "North Pole," came up the harbor here and dropped anchor off the main wharf of the town. Before he had been ashore three hours Commander Peary received a telegram from Mr. Bert L. Bridgman, the secretary of the Peary Arctic Club, of New York City, and after reading it he dictated the following statement, to be given to all the newspaper correspondents in Sydney:

"Acting on the advice of General Hubbard and Herbert L. Bridgman, the president and secretary of the Peary Arctic Club, I wish to express my thanks to all my friends for their kind offers and invitations, and also I beg to say that I prefer to accept no invitation to a public reception or ovation until the present controversy has been settled by competent authority."

SOUTHERN STORM LOSS. Five Dead at New Orleans, Two at Jackson—Property Damage Heavy.

Louisville, Ky.—Central in Mississippi and swinging northward at the rate of 200 miles a day, the hurricane which swept the Gulf Coast left a trail of ruin through four States. In New Orleans five persons were killed. A million dollars will not repair the damage done to the city. It is said that to replace the plate glass alone will cost \$100,000.

It is believed that the timber destruction in Mississippi will equal that of four years ago, when more than \$5,000,000 worth of timber was felled.

From the summer colonies on the Louisiana and Mississippi Gulf Coast come tales of devastation and fears that many lives have been lost. The summer tourists who own pleasure craft are wont to spend much time upon them, and it is possible that many have been lost.

Jackson, Miss., the capital of the State, was cut off from the coast points. Two lives were lost there. The dome of the new Capitol was wrecked and the old Capitol was unroofed. The streets were a tangle of live wires, and the fallen trees and debris made the highways impassable.

At Vicksburg two vessels were sunk and a third was driven ashore. Their passengers were rescued. One vessel lies across the channel and blocked navigation.

BRISTOL, VA., DECLARED "WET." Recent Local Option Election Confirmed in Court.

Bristol, Va.—Judge Kelly decided the recent local option election was valid and that the town is wet. Preparation for opening several saloons is now under way. The contest case grew out of the local option election of July 8, which the "wets" won by thirty-two votes. The "drys" claimed 170 votes were cast by alleged non-residents.

Struck His Flirting Wife. Frank O'Connor went strolling along Michigan Boulevard, Chicago, with his wife. He was watching automobiles go by, and he avers his wife was watching the men. He asserted that when a peculiarly dashing pedestrian passed she smiled on him and then said: "Isn't that a handsome man?" He struck her and both were arrested. When arraigned before Judge Fake O'Connor explained the case. "A woman's eyes and words should be for her husband alone," quoth the Justice. "Discharged!"

Taft Meets Japanese. President Taft met, at Minneapolis, Minn., the party of Japanese business men touring the United States, and spoke pleasantly of the relations of the two countries.

Bloodhounds Run Down Slayer. James King, who is charged with assassinating Charles Scribner from ambush near Beattyville, Ky., was captured by a posse of officers with bloodhounds after a chase of five days. King, it is reported, has confessed to the killing.

Fairbanks Lectures in Manila. Former Vice-President Fairbanks delivered an address in the Methodist Church at Manila, P. I., on the life work of President McKinley.

Woman Smoker, 92, Burns to Death. At Peoria, Ill., Mrs. Mary Riordan, ninety-two, died in agony as the result of burns. She was smoking a pipe when some tobacco sparks alighted on her dress, creating a blaze which enveloped her. For eighty years she had lived in Illinois.

First Council in Canada. The first Catholic plenary council ever held in Canada finished its sessions at Quebec recently.



