Hendersonville, Nov. 18-The finishing house of the Skyland Hosiery Mill at Flat Rock, and a small ware-house adjacent thereat an early hour today. The loss is about \$75,000, with an insurance of three-fourths.

The finishing mill was a 75x150 feet brick structure, two stories high There was much stock in progress of manufacture and such inflammable material in the building. The watchman discovered smoke issuing from it at 5a. m. and in an bour and a quarter all that was left was two of the brick walls, partially ruined. The emploves turned out in force and fought the flames stubbornly, and good pressure; but it was blowing a regular gale from the north, and the progress of the flames could hardly be checked, much less arrested. Woods to the south a mile away was fired by sparks from the conflagration. Indeed, it was with difficulty that the other part of the factory, the knitting mill, was saved, although the direction of the wind wasfavorable. The two struc tures were about 25 feet apart, and connected by a gangway.

The origin of the fire is not certainly known. However, last night was cold and windy, following a period of dry, balmy weather; it is such autumn nights that dry out deflective flues of boilers and heating plants.

The finishing mill was a new buildling, and the plant had been running only seven or eight months.
