MR. McKAY'S LETTER.

Rutherfordton, N. C., March 20th, 1911.

Editor "News:"

The attention of the members of the Board of Directors of the North Carolina Interurban Railway Company has been called to the "News" issue of March 16th, containing an article by an undisclosed contributor, and your unfriendly comment on the proposed effort to secure for your town and county a railroad, and, the writer has been instructed to lay before the people, through the med um of your paper, the Rev. Richard Champion conduct- attitude of the above named railroad company.

> We seek no controversy over this matter, with either your contributor or any one else, nor is the company greatly interested in the projection of the line, or pushing any effort to induce the Polk County people to interest themselves in the railway project at all; indeed for months the board have steadily refused to proceed in any way concerning this or any other branch lines, and it was only after the receipt of a great number of letters, County citizens and sustained effort had been made by the people of the County that authority was finally given to look into the proposition. It may also be added that this was not done until the financiers had been especially consulted with reference to the matter and had given their consent in writing.

> The people were given to understand and are again advised that the writer, who made the recent visit along the line in company with Mr. W. A. Harrill and the chief engineer of the company, is neither the projector nor the p omoter of the railway, but mere y occupies the position of an employee, without a place on the b ard of directors, without the authority to either build or withhold a railroad line through the County, and if your contributor had been so fully advised as he pretends as to the gentlemen constituting the board, it is inconceivable that he would have suggested that they were endeavoring to secure employment for engineers, or graft for themselves, and in addition would have known that the writer is neither a so-called engineer nor an engineer of any kind.

The gentleman suggests that a practical plan is to ask the people to take stock in the company, citing the procedure of the Duke syndicate as an example of proper promotion. This is precisely what this company is proposing; but instead of asking the people along the line to subscribe and pay for sufficient stock to build one quarter of the line, as the Dukes are doing, all it asks or has suggested is that a fund of four thousand dollars be raised, the company to take care of the
