

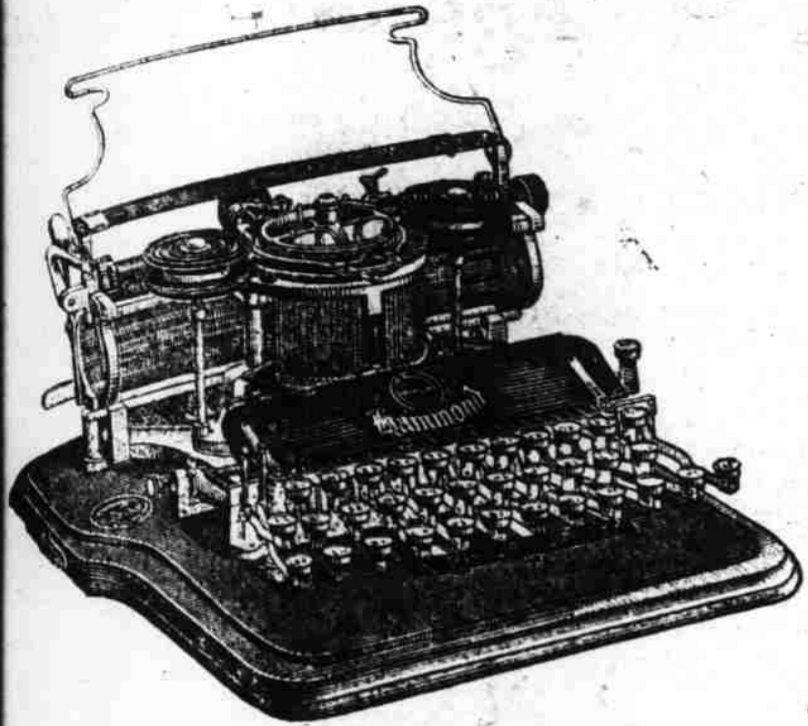

To the Editor of the Polk County News, Saluda, N. C.:

At a meeting of the Superintending Committee and the Teachers of the Union Bible School, called to consider the problems for the coming year, the successes and difficulties of the past as well as existing conditions were fully discussed.

In February 1911 a strong, union Bible School was organized with the hearty support of all the Churches and Christian influences of Tryon.

The Public, Graded School building was selected in which to hold the services, both because it was particularly appropriate for a union, popular Bible School—a school of aid for the whole community—and because it was the only building of sufficient size and suitable arrangement of rooms available. The enthusiastic backing by all the Christian bodies was delightful and showed a sweetness of spirit and breadth of view that was most inspiring. The large size of the school made it possible to so grade the scholars that the great truths of the Bible could be taught over and over again in ways to appeal most strongly to the minds and hearts of pupils of all ages.

It truly seemed that the broad reawakening of interest in Bible study and Sunday School work, which has, during the past few years, swept over the whole country, had also come to Tryon. Reports of our successes highly commended by the great body of earnest Sunday School workers in many States.

The enthusiasm of success filled our hearts until certain physical conditions, over which we had no control, began to bear down upon the very soul and spirit of this movement.

These unhappy conditions are too well known and too sadly felt to be repeated at length but it is most important for everyone to realize that these physical conditions are the real and vital causes for the suspension of the Union Bible School.

At this meeting, after most careful consideration, the following resolution was unanimously passed:

Whereas, for the past two winters it has been impossible to safely heat the School

house on Sundays, to protect the literature and materials of the Bible School from vandalism by unknown people, to keep the various rooms clean and in order, and thereby surround our pupils with an uplifting and spiritual influence, and

Whereas, we see no way of correcting or even improving the above injurious conditions,

Therefore, with sincere regret, we resolve that the Union Bible School shall indefinitely suspend its services.

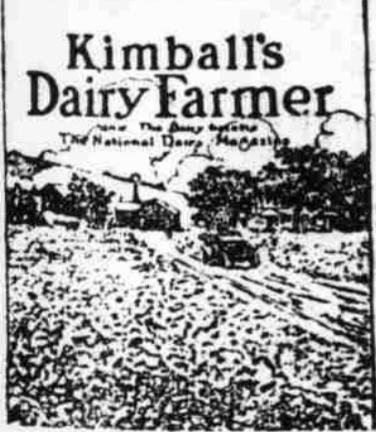

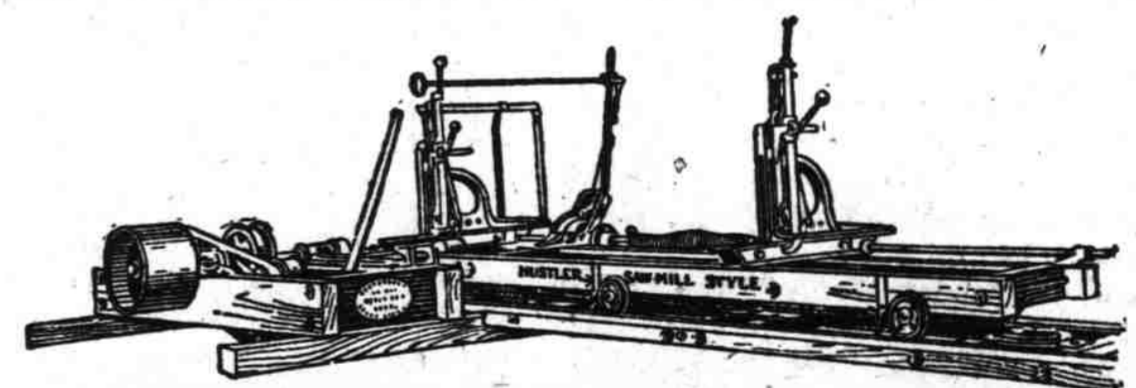

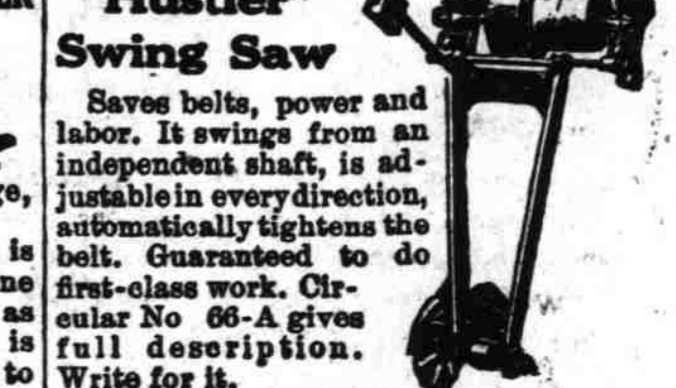
